#### From The Pastor

Selfishness is the enemy of the Christian life. Obvious as this is, what is not always obvious are the threads of selfishness that diminish life in the Holy Spirit. When St. Paul talks about freedom, as he does in the second reading, he knows what he is talking about. Prior to his conversion to Christ, Saul was not a free man. He believed himself to be free, but he was a slave to the Law and its ritual dictates as an expression of his zeal for God. Saul, later to become Paul, was trapped in the perfectionism of his ego that drove him to rigidly keep the Law as a matter of personal justification. He believed himself to be beyond reproach or liability in his religious practice. His stance before God was under his control.

Then it wasn't. Confronted with the Spirit of Jesus on the road to Damascus, everything changed. Through his transformation away from the Law, Paul went as far as to say he considered all things in the past pure rubbish compared to the life of the Spirit he had been given in Christ Jesus. He came to the awareness that God's justice given through the Cross of Jesus was pure gift. Secure in the love of Christ, St. Paul moves from a stance of selfishness to a radical freedom with complete peace in God, and a zeal to share the message with others.

How did Paul come to this awareness? Through the acceptance of the deep and saving love of Jesus revealed to him by grace. He did not earn it, merit it, or deserve it. The grace of his conversion was the transformation from ego driven selfishness to a full surrender in the acceptance of the love given him in Christ Jesus. This is the context of today's second reading and the tension it creates between living in the Spirit or living in the flesh.

When St. Paul talks about living in the flesh, he is not talking about sexual morality. He is talking about the strong tendency of human nature toward selfishness, living in the ways of the world, being in control for the betterment and defense of self. Living in the Spirit is living in the freedom of deeply trusting the love of God revealed and given in the Lord Jesus. Life in love heals selfishness because it secures a person in the value of their dignity and their importance to the Giver of Love. Secure in love frees a person to share themselves for the good of others. Free from the dictates of the Law, St. Paul is confident to say the Law is fulfilled in one statement, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' This is what it means to live in the Spirit; to go beyond the self for others because of the love of Christ so freely given to all.

This theme is consistent with the other two readings.

The first reading describes the transfer of prophetic power from Elijah to Elisha. The story indicates that Elisha was not actively seeking this way of life. As directed by God, Elijah finds Elisha in a field plowing, simply going about his business for the good of his family. As an elegant symbolic gesture, the retiring prophet throws his cloak over the shoulders of the younger man. Elisha knows instinctively what this means. His only request is to take leave of his parents and family. Notice his 'all-in' gesture indicating his full acceptance of God's call. Twelve oxen indicate his prosperity. Yet, he readily slaughters them, cooks them, and serves them to his family and the village. His commitment to God is a full-on yes, with full freedom and without selfish concern. In return, God blesses him with a double portion of Elijah's spirit.

The gospel describes a turning point in the ministry of Jesus. He is now turning with full resolution to Jerusalem to fulfill his saving mission through death on the Cross. Two movements are evident. First, the strong and gentle love of Jesus will not serve violence against those who resist him. He rebukes the disciples who wish to call down fire on the Samaritans. The path of Jesus will be unselfish surrender to the Cross in perfect love for the salvation of all.

Next, Jesus directs those who wish to follow him. The first would-be follower acclaims, "I will follow you wherever you go." He does not understand the nature of Jesus' mission. To follow Jesus is to imitate him wherever you are, not merely following him around. Jesus invites the second one, but the excuse comes to bury his father. Jesus responds, "let the dead bury the dead." In other words, let the unbelieving and the selfish bury the dead. Lastly, another wants to first say goodbye at home. Jesus calls for full heartedness. "No one who sets his hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." To look back is to make crooked rows due to undivided attention. The way of Jesus calls for full awareness in love directed to God through others.

Consider your freedom in the Spirit. God is not a taskmaster demanding repayment for gifts given. To live in the Spirit is to live in love. Mature love is self-giving. It thinks of the other first. It seeks to live and act in the model of Jesus. In the generosity of Divine love, serving others comes as a freedom in the realization of all that has been given.

This reminds me of a saying posted in a high school religion classroom. "I am third." God is first. Others are second. I am third. This is not self-diminishment, but freedom in the Spirit to be of a mind for others.

#### Laws of Love

St. Paul has a unique vision of freedom. We often think that freedom means I can do what I want without interference from an outside source, such as a bureaucracy or a dictator. For most Americans, it means being able to take care of myself and my family, hopefully without having to pay too much in taxes. We usually associate that with the "pursuit of happiness" without thinking too much about what happiness is. What makes Paul's idea unique is that his vision of happiness means serving one another in love. For Paul, freedom is not so much being free from oppression as being free to love and serve those around us.

What would stop us from loving others? It could be fear: "I'm not sure I would be able to do any good. I'm afraid of going into a bad neighborhood to help the homeless. I fear that if I were more generous to the poor (church, Red Cross, life issues, etc.), I would not have enough for my family." Or it could be attachment to possessions or even to our family—the man in the Gospel wasn't free to follow Jesus because he thought it meant leaving his family behind.

Paul talks about another kind of freedom when he says that following the Spirit means freedom from the Law (Galatians 5:18). He was not talking about ignoring the speed limit or pirating DVDs. He meant people who were obsessed with keeping all the laws and customs that were part of the Jewish tradition. It would be like someone who goes to Mass on Sunday only because he doesn't want to break a Church law, or someone who drives the speed limit only because he doesn't want to pay a fine. Taken to an extreme, you would have to memorize every law on the books to be sure you did not break one. The freedom of the Spirit is a life lived out of love. A person would go to Mass out of love for God; a driver would obey the speed limit to protect other drivers. As long as we love one another, we wouldn't have to worry about breaking the law, for God's laws are all examples of how to love one another. Tom Schmidt, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

# TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION



The pilgrim experience of going by foot to Santiago

de Compostella, the shrine of St. James (pictured above), reaches its high point a month from now at the feast of the Apostle(July 25th). By now, tens of thousands of pilgrims are already on the road. Typically, they cover twelve to twenty miles a day through rough territory. The difficult journey and the often primitive lodging facilities are made bearable by the joy of the pilgrims, their songs and prayers. When their journey is documented properly, they receive the scallop shell, a reminder not only of James the fisherman, but also his call to fish for human beings and to baptize the nations. In the Middle Ages, those who wore this badge on their hats were granted lodging and hospitality wherever they went. Next to the palm, the sign of a Jerusalem pilgrim, the scallop shell was most highly prized.

In the Middle Ages, some people so enjoyed the pilgrim road, although it was filled with discomfort and danger, that they spent most of their lives on the road. Today, some people take up the route for exercise, but are drawn gradually into the spirituality of the journey. As you make your summer travels, always fold in an element of pilgrimage: a long walk through beautiful countryside, a visit to a church, a prayer of gratitude for your journey through life's hills and valleys.

# Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

We return to Ordinary Time this Sunday, and with this new season we focus on what it means to be a person who is called by God for some definite purpose. Elisha recognized God's call in Elijah's greeting and prepared immediately to follow. The people who came to Jesus seemed ready to follow, yet each had reasons to linger behind. As people who are given the freedom to follow or to stay behind, we must ask ourselves what we are ready to do for the sake of Christ and the call of the gospel. What are you called to do at this time in your life? Are you prepared to leave behind the things that get in the way of living as a Christian?

#### **FOLLOW**

What does it mean to follow Jesus? The Gospels show us that Jesus called each person individually, recognizing the things that stood in the way for each. He looked into the person's heart and saw the true desires of the person standing before him. Each of us experiences Christ's call uniquely as the persons we are. For some, following requires us to take stock of our lives and let go of the obstacles that keep us from the way of true discipleship. For others, the call may lead us to deepen the way that faith directs our lives, with more intentional time in prayer, regular participation in Mass, renewed attention to family, involvement in our parish, or new acts of service.

#### **BE READY**

It is easy to say we want to follow Jesus, yet most of us feel competing desires that stand in the way of discipleship. We may be distracted by the constant swirl of activity so prevalent in our surrounding culture; we might be lured by worldly wealth and the status that often accompanies it; we may simply be comfortable with the way things are and find it difficult to risk changing anything. In today's Gospel, Jesus makes it clear that we must stop putting off making the changes that will bring us closer to him and to God's way of life. We must trust in the Lord, knowing that what he most deeply desires is that we be close to him. If you encountered Jesus today and said you were ready to follow him, what would he see in your heart, what obstacles or hesitations would he perceive? Go to Jesus in prayer this day. Listen to him say, "Follow me." Prayerfully place your life in the Lord's hands and be ready to follow.
