From The Pastor

In today's gospel, God is not the irreverent, unjust judge intentionally difficult in the face of human concerns. If either character in the gospel is an image of God, it is the persistent widow who tenaciously pleads her cause to gain rightful justice. God is faithful, compassionate, and trustworthy to all who seek him.

Prayer is a communion of love between the believer and the God whom we seek. As an act of trust, we yield to the Lord our deepest desires, needs, and concerns in the hope of God's provident care. Prayer is built on the understanding and acceptance of our dependence on the Lord and is loving care. On our own, we can do nothing of value without the direction and care of the Divine will. Prayer is not begging. We do not have to shout and scream or shove our needs before the Lord as if in a long line of traffic as we sneak to the front confident we can wiggle in.

Prayer is relationship in our desire to be one with God in the awareness and faith that God seeks to be one with us. This is not, 'I'll scratch your back if you scratch mine.' Prayer is desire built on faith, trust, and experience of a God who first came to us in the hope of our acceptance of the Divine offer. God does not play hard to get, keep score of debts, or count the long absences between contacts. If you want to practice and learn how to be in relationship or how to be a friend, practice with God. You can tell God anything and he will not repeat it. You can trust God. You can tell God your hurts, losses, fears, and sins. You can talk to God about your dreams and plans, hopes, and desires. God wants to know these things beforehand. Before making plans for anything, ask the Lord for his wisdom and will. Things will always go better with the Lord in the driver's seat.

This is the case with Moses, Joshua, and the Israelites as they are confronted with war against Amalek. As the Israelites journeyed through the desert to the Promised Land, they are confronted by those who already occupy the land. Notice the first action of Moses. He prays. He will not enter the fray before he has engaged the Lord his God. Further, he instructs Joshua to set his battle plan only after Moses has set himself in prayer.

With staff in hand, Moses raises his arms in prayer to God trusting in the power of Divine providence. The staff is the symbol of his authority and power before the Lord. This is the staff with which he struck the rock that flowed with gushing water, divided the Red Sea, and had previously called forth the seven plagues as the Israelites sought freedom from the Egyptian Pharaoh.

In time, Moses grew tired and his arms wavered.

Prayer is not always singular. We pray in and with the support of a larger community. Aaron and Hur hold up the arms of Moses that the favor of God remain with them. We all grow tired at times. We need the encouragement of others to help us persevere in prayer and the works of the Christian life. Sometimes we pray for others. Sometimes others pray for us. In times of discouragement or weariness, remembering that others are praying for you is all it takes to feel the grace to persevere. Intercessory prayer is powerful and essential to sustain the Christian life. The angels and saints are constantly praying and praising God on our behalf. Jesus is praying for you even as the Holy Spirit prays in you and carries your prayers to the Father.

The point of the gospel is the perseverance of the widowed woman. She is alone and without an advocate. Still, the judge has a duty to give her a just hearing. Note that the story is directed to the disciples as they travel to Jerusalem with Jesus. He is teaching them the necessity and value of prayer and its persistence. Primary attention should not be given to the judge. Jesus is using an odd little example to accentuate the perseverance needed in prayer. In the end, due to her persistence the woman gains her just due.

Some will say God is too slow in answering our prayer. God's silence or delay in response is often God's wisdom. We fail to realize all the things God has to put in place before our prayer can be answered. If our prayer is for another person, perhaps God is waiting for that person to cooperate with his will for them. The lack of a perceptible response does not mean God is not listening. Sometimes God's answer may be no. If so, another path will be opened.

Prayer is a lifelong endeavor. Like any relationship, our prayer should change as we grow and mature in faith, trust, love for, and response to God's presence in our lives. Keeping love alive over the long haul can be quite a challenge. Like a long and faithful marriage, prayer will ebb and flow with the rhythms of life and the blessings and challenges of love. Even the deepest love needs regular nourishment and fresh expressions to animate the beloved. The same is true in our relationship with God.

We persist with many things in life to sustain the stability, security, and comforts we seek. Prayer is the most important. Without God as our source of truth in love through life we would soon be lost and aimless on our strength alone. God will never leave us. With prayer, we are assured of his constant and faithful presence.

PERSEVERANCE

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives a clever example of why we are to persevere in praying, even if we think the prayer is not being heard. The crooked judge just wanted to get that widow off his back. So we can pray to God with even more confidence, because we know that God loves us and will answer our prayers.

St. Paul carries that theme of perseverance even further. He is not just talking about prayer here; he encourages Timothy to persevere in proclaiming God's word as well. That command we may find more challenging than prayer. He tells Timothy (and us!) to "convince, reprimand and encourage through all patience and teaching" (2 Timothy 4:2). How can we do that?

"Convince" reminds me that our faith should be reasonable. Jesus' command to love one another, for instance, can be taught much more convincingly by giving examples of love. A mother who hugs her child when he is hurt and encourages him when he feels lost is teaching that command in a way that will be remembered much longer than just telling him to love people.

Paul also talks about reprimanding each other. Most people find it difficult to reprimand someone they are in charge of, much less one who is equal in status. That's where patience comes in. A reprimand can be made patiently and gently, as a sign of concern rather than authority.

Paul lastly mentions teaching. Parents can do their part by teaching the stories from the Bible, helping children to see God in creation, teaching them to pray, and being good examples of God's love for them. If you send your children to religion classes or the parish school, do what you can to support the teachers so that what the children learn at school is practiced at home.

Lord Jesus,

You are the Divine Physician and Healer. To You, we lift up in prayer all who are lonely, homeless, sick or addicted; all who are unemployed or underemployed; all who are anxious or depressed and all who are suffering in any way spiritually, physically or emotionally in these difficult times. In their pain and brokenness, we ask that you bring them the comfort of your loving presence. In You, may they find strength for the day and hope for the journey. Amen

40 Days for Life is a National Prayer Campaign to end abortion. Participants offer prayers, fasting, and peaceful vigils at local abortion centers if able.



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


CATECHETICAL SUNDAY AT SVF

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ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS


A new change has been made in the title of the process in which adults are prepared in the Catholic Church for Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist, and for reception into the Catholic Church for persons already Baptized in another Christian tradition. Formerly known as “RCIA” or Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, the process will now be referred to as “OCIA” or “Order of Christian Initiation of Adults.” “Why the change?” you may ask. This is a change that focuses on the initiation process, recognizing the candidates for the sacraments of initiation are in a life-changing journey within the Catholic community. Upon participation in the “Rite of Acceptance” at which candidates express their free choice to pursue preparation for the Sacraments, they officially are welcomed into the Church’s “Order of Catechumens” which affords them certain rights in the church.

The ongoing support of our local faith community is essential for this journey. So please pray for those who may be considering a call to Baptism within our parish. If you know an adult who is at this place in her/his life, encourage them to contact Mary Ann Przybysz, OCIA coordinator, at the parish office, (248)542-8720.

GOD'S PERSISTENCE

Today's Gospel is set within Jesus' instruction to his disciples to prepare for a future after his ascension, and before Christ's final return. The early Church lived in an unjust and violent world, and likely wondered when Christ would return to complete his work. In this context, we hear a parable of a corrupt judge and a widow seeking justice. The widow has no worldly resources to affect the judge, but only her own persistence. And that was enough.

We today also live in an unjust world, and we the Church long for Christ to fulfill God's promises. But we are not asked to wait passively; instead we must join God's work in bringing justice. We can imitate the widow with our persistence in prayer and action to be instruments of peace in our own place and time. These efforts might well extend beyond our own lifespans, but God will inspire new instruments of peace in future generations. God's persistence will be enough.

A DEEP BREATH

In today's passage from 2 Timothy, we hear that "all scripture is inspired." The Greek word translated as "inspired" literally means "God-breathed." That is, God breathes God's own life in and through scripture. We can see ourselves also as "God-breathed," as God's creation was the result of God's speech in Genesis, and as the Church received the Spirit from Jesus' breath (John 20:22). God breathes in and through these writings, and in our encounters with each other, to enliven and to transform us.

Using this word, Paul invites Timothy to engage with scripture, to allow it to teach, correct, and train. Scripture is not a set of rules or an answer book, but a breath of God's fresh air. It is the record of flawed human beings encountering a loving yet mysterious God. It is the story of God and humanity where we can place our life stories in dialogue with God's story. Take a deep breath.

TO SERVE AS GOOD STEWARDS


As each one has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace. (1 Peter 4:10)

The Catholic Church believes that everyone has received gifts or talents from God, and we need to be stewards of them. This means that we need to use our gifts for good. But it is not always easy to recognize our own gifts and talents. Sometimes we need to ask someone in our family or a good friend to help us identify them. What would you name as your top five gifts or talents?

The U. S. Bishops' Pastoral Letter on Stewardship, *To Be a Christian Steward*, suggests four steps to take once we recognize our gifts.

1. *We should receive God's gifts gratefully.* Do you thank God every day for the gifts you receive and ask God to help you share them?
2. *We should cultivate them responsibly.* Do you try to develop your gifts every day by practicing them and using them only for good?
3. *We should share them lovingly in justice with others.* Do you share your gifts with only those people you like or who are your friends? Do you also think about sharing them with those who aren't your friends, or people in need, or people in other schools or in the neighborhood?
4. *We should return them with increase to the Lord.* If you identify your gifts, practice them, and share them, they increase and grow stronger. Then we offer them back to God by praying in thanksgiving for them and asking God to help us use them wisely. Do you offer your thanks in prayer at the end of the day? At Mass?

As a family, name at least one gift each person has. Talk about the four steps of becoming good stewards.



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
TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION



Although the hours of daylight are rapidly dwindling, many people would say that these October days bring the year's most splendid weather. Americans are riders and joggers, not strollers, and so the pleasures of the season are often lost on us. This is not the case with many Jewish people, who observe an ancient rule in walking to synagogue on the Sabbath. On city streets and suburban sidewalks in many cities, we may notice around sunset the nicely dressed families walking and chatting on Friday afternoon. After a short prayer at dusk, the families stroll home again for a relaxing and festive meal. They return to synagogue in the morning, and then spend an afternoon in family leisure until three stars appear in the night sky and Sabbath ends.

Catholics, on the other hand, pile into the car and drive even a short distance to Mass; some even divide the family to participate at different hours. For Jews, the leisurely walk marks a dividing line between hectic life commitments and a day of abundant joy and enrichment. Before we became an automobile culture, Catholics embraced a similar pace, and in most places walked to church. These lovely days of fall invite us to tap into an old and life-giving tradition. If you live within a mile of your church, walk next week. If you must drive, park at a good distance and walk the rest of the way. Talk about your life, greet strangers, notice the crunch of leaves under your shoes. You may be surprised at how different Sunday Mass feels when it is framed by leisure!

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
