From The Pastor

The goal of the Christian life is union with God. Union with God begins now through our relationship with Christ who is the revelation of Divine truth in the fruit of our redemption. Faith in God is built on maturing trust through the lived experience of Divine mercy, forgiveness, and justice. Jesus is the Incarnate reality of God's presence in our sinful world as we face the challenges of this perilous journey from life in the flesh to the fulness of life in the Spirit.

God's love is constant, faithful, and unchanging. Given the trials and tragedies of this life, faith and trust in the providence of God will only be realized in a living relationship committed to prayer and attention to the presence and action of God in the self and in the world. For those with eyes to see, God is ever-present and willing to be found. For those who do evil, God becomes a myth, or a lie made up to soothe the pain and suffering of the oppressed.

Ideally, all would believe in God. However, as St. Paul made clear in last week's second reading, '...that we may be delivered from the perverse and wicked people, for not all have faith.' The perverse and the wicked tempt the faith of the believer as they see arrogant evildoers in the comfort of their power and prosperity. Where is God and why does the justice of God allow our suffering?

The readings today are about judgment and the last days. The tone is unpleasant, even scary. However, the intention and final message is one of hope for those who cling to faith in times of destruction and fear. 'Lo, the day is coming...' The day that is coming is the day of the Lord; the last days when the just and the righteous will be received by God while the arrogant and all evil doers will be 'set on fire, leaving them neither root nor branch...' They will come to nothingness and will be no more.

Why? As the essence of love, God desires that all share in the Divine union. Christian believers understand that God's judgment on the world is Jesus. God's judgement is mercy for all who seek it. Weak and wayward sinners are included in the Divine mercy of redemption in their desire and faith to be with God. Not all want God. Not all are willing to surrender to mercy or admit personal weakness in need of forgiveness. Those lost in the wiles and confusion of evil live in the delusion of their own power. That power may come through wealth, control, violence, and authority over others. It often includes lies, deception, confusion, and manipulation to disrupt human goodness. The truth of love is denied and rejected. God is lost and the dignity of the human person is limited

only to the ability to control others. In the view of the world this can be a heady and appealing state of being. If I can get that, why shouldn't I?

There is no reality without love. Love is truth, God is love, Jesus is God. Love is the essence of all being. Those who reject and refuse love for the sake of self-made authority, worldly wealth and its power will come to nothing; no thing, without reality or being. This is what inspires the image of a blazing fire that leaves nothing but stubble.

Christ remains, the Alpha and the Omega. The beginning and the end. God is the origin and the conclusion of all that is. Sin is forgiven. Weakness and failure are healed. The lost are found and the wayward will be welcomed home. God will claim all who seek him. Those who look truth in the face and call it a lie refuse the gift God offers. Blasphemy is the only unforgiveable sin. Those who deny and reject the truth of Divine love revealed and given in the person of Jesus choose to bind themselves away from God. God will accept and heal all. Only those who willingly and intentionally refuse this offer will be lost.

Why are Christians hated and persecuted? Because Christians hold a power the world does not understand that cannot be changed, manipulated, or controlled. Jesus was hated and killed because he exposed the injustice and oppression of those who wantonly denied the dignity of others. John the Baptist was beheaded because he exposed the adultery of Herod taking his brother's wife. Christians who speak and reveal the truth of God are persecuted by those whose guilt and shame are exposed. Evil does not need a reason to do evil because it is evil and will do anything to disrupt the works of God.

Where is the hope? In Jesus who bore the weight of our sin and weakness that we may know the freedom and wholeness of his love. Although the destruction of the Temple is historically true, Jesus uses the image to reveal a new spiritual reality. Jesus himself is the living temple of the Divine presence in the world. Believing in Jesus, accepting Baptism, and living the movements and virtues of the Christian life makes us a dwelling place of Christ in the world. You are a temple of God and an image of Christ for all who see the light of your goodness.

We hope and long for the promise of the day of the Lord. The final day is the day of eternal glory. Yet, every day is the day of the Lord. Every day we can make God present in the world by living the love we profess as we journey to heaven. Our hope and our promise is heaven and Jesus is the way. Let us be at peace as we persevere to the end.



NO GOOD DEED GOES UNPUNISHED

When Jesus rose from the dead, he showed his disciples that even death will be overcome by God. In today's Gospel, he expands that to include most of the bad things that can happen to both non-believers and disciples alike. Starting with the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem, Jesus mentions most of the scary things that people thought would bring the end of the world. He gives two pieces of advice. First, don't be fooled by anyone who says this is the end or who claims to be Jesus. When Jesus comes again, there will be no doubt about who it is. Then, don't be terrified by natural disasters or wars. As disciples, we hope we would respond to disasters not with fear, but with love. Believers can voluntarily help those affected, comfort the survivors, or help rebuild their homes or schools. People have welcomed strangers into their homes after a flood or hurricane has destroyed a neighborhood.

There is a saying that "no good deed goes unpunished." Jesus never says that his disciples would be given awards for their acts of charity. In the second half of the Gospel, he says that his disciples would be persecuted, hated, and even betrayed by their own families. Jesus has advice for that situation, too. He tells us "not to prepare your defense," but to let him give us the words. I suspect that he means not to worry about what you might say, lest you become scared speechless. If you let him, Jesus will "prepare" you with the scripture readings, your pastor's homilies, and your own prayer life. All of these can help open us to the gifts of the Spirit, who helps us proclaim our faith without fear.

FAITH FOR FORMATION



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Last Monday, the children in our religious education program learned an invocation of the Holy Spirit to pray before class to help them enter into the lessons and listen to the proclamation of the Good News from their catechists. The proclamation of the Good News, the announcement of Christianity, is called the 'kerygma', which is the Greek word for 'announcement'. It was this same announcement that the apostles made upon receiving the Holy Spirit and leaving the Cenacle. It is a powerful announcement that Jesus is the Christ, the one chosen by God to liberate all people from sin by His death and resurrection. Hearing this announcement caused those who listened to it to respond. When they asked St. Peter what they needed to do, he told them to convert and be baptized. Each day we are called to convert - to recognize our sins and ask the Lord to help us live Christian lives. This is why the sacrament of Reconciliation is so important for us to frequent. Going to confession is not just about confessing our sins, but also to receive the grace that comes from the sacrament to truly convert and change our lives. If you haven't been to confession in some time, I encourage you to go and receive the graces that God wants to give you through this sacrament. It is a gift that we can confess our sins, receive absolution, and be put back on the path to conversation, seeking the Lord with all our heart.



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

Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

It is easy to go through life non-reflectively, living the routines of our days and weeks without giving much thought to the larger questions of meaning, purpose, and calling. We may know we need to change but put it off, thinking we'll love, serve, and care more in the future.

We may face trial personally and be weary of trying to live as we know we should. We witness discord, violence, and division and it may feel that it is the end of the world. Today's readings urge us to put laziness, fear, or distraction aside and get about the work of discipleship with the assurance that the Lord will provide what we need as we do so.

THE SUN OF JUSTICE WILL ARISE

It may seem as though Jesus is talking directly to us in today's Gospel. While it is always true that the Gospel speaks across time and space, today's message feels particularly appropriate as we near the end of another year that has been filled with pandemic, political division, international tension, and economic concerns. Christ reigns over all these things, and as Christians, we hold firm in the belief that we will as well. We must take the long view—the truly long view of eternity—as we meet the challenges of our time. The sun of justice will arise. All will be well.

NOT A HAIR ON YOUR HEAD WILL BE DESTROYED. PERSEVERE.

The message of the Gospel is not abstract, nor are we distant hearers of its message. We face choices every day about how we will live, what we will or won't do, how seriously we will take Christ's call to live the truth of the gospel. At times, the choices we face seem inconsequential: will we sit on the sofa night after night, or choose to spend time with family or serve in our parish? Will we get up for Mass on Sunday morning ready to praise God and be part of our faith community, or drag ourselves there, grumbling every step of the way (or not go at all)? Choices such as these are of consequence of course, not only because each decision matters, but the patterns we establish in our lives are rooted in the cumulative weight of the choices we make. We may be called upon to make harder choices and must be prepared to do so. Jesus tells us to persevere. By doing so, we will secure our lives.




