# From The Pastor

A picture will leave a very different impression depending on how it is framed. A dark frame surrounding the early morning light of a sunrise will create a different tone than a brighter frame. The same is true of how we hear things. Tone and context make a big difference. We have all heard the phrase, 'Its not what you say, but how you say it.'

How do you say or put a frame around, "...love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you?" In the frame and tone of our culture today the phrase is quickly dismissed as ridiculous and out of touch with social reality. If someone takes your jacket, how do you say to them; 'Here, take my sweater too.' Pretty much the same reaction, right? Easily dismissed as unreal.

Let's try a new frame that may more effectively reveal the wisdom of the words. Your life is framed by your profession of faith as a Christian. In the frame of faith, with a professed love for God and love of neighbor, God directs us in the first reading: ..."Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy." As people in the Spirit, this should have an impact on our spiritual sensibility. In the mind of our culture, the phrase would be ignored. However, the believer knows otherwise. We may not feel holy, but any half-conscious believer knows we are called to be holy because in Christ we share the Divine life of God.

St. Paul strengthens the frame further, saying: "Do you not know that you are a temple of God, and the Spirit of God dwells in you?" We have all heard these words and they should be a steady frame of how we see ourselves in God and God in us. I do not always actively feel this spiritual truth, but I hold it deeply as a personal identity. The call to holiness and the acceptance of ourselves as a dwelling place of God serves as an inner ownership of who we are as believers. It is the frame through which we see ourselves in the world, and how the world is to see us. If we do not hold ourselves in this frame of life, how is Christ to be known or seen in us?

If we are living in the Christian frame of holiness as a dwelling place of the Holy Spirit, the call to love our enemies is heard quite differently. It calls us to move beyond the frame of human wisdom, to a Divine one. Human wisdom is largely characterized by getting ahead, having more than the other guy, and staying ahead of an enemy. Divine wisdom is characterized by humility, surrender, and other centered self-giving. Completely different frames, right?

Jesus is calling us to practice the model of his own example. In the end, Jesus humbly surrendered his life on the Cross out of self-giving love. It was the only way to prove that love is stronger than evil, sin, and death. In the Resurrection, love wins. Each of us is a beneficiary of this radical act of self-surrender. Perhaps the most radical aspect of the Cross is that it was offered to all, friends and enemies alike. Jesus fulfills the Divine wisdom in his willingness to heal and forgive, casting no one off as an enemy. The human way tends to operate from an ability to conquer and kill rather than to reconcile.

How do we get from here to there? How do we love our enemies and peacefully pray for our persecutors? We will only be able to love others to the degree that we love ourselves. We are all aware that self-love is not automatic. The human experience is a wounded one. The pain of our hurt causes us to create walls, defenses, and resistance against our vulnerabilities. This leads to moods of competition, division, and a we-they stance against the world. People are labeled as enemies or friends while those in the middle often become invisible.

Growing in self-love comes from a secure trust in the acceptance of God's love for us. Self-love matures into the freedom to be open to the needs and concerns of others out of empathy and compassion. Mature love by nature is other centered. Human love is never perfect this side of heaven. We are all sinners trying to live lovingly in a wounded sinful world. Tensions will inevitably arise. Love yields to compromise rather than competition. This is the meaning of the call to be perfect. Perfection is necessary in math, science, and medicine. There is no such thing as a perfect human being. Perfection in scripture means wholeness or completion. To be whole and complete is to persevere to the end with faith and love. Jesus was perfect in his mission and identity in the world as he brought to completion the Father's will in perfect surrender to death on the Cross.

It was hard to be Jesus. It is hard to imitate Jesus in the world today. Remember your frame. You are holy. You belong to God. You are in God and God is in you. You are a temple of God's dwelling in the world. That frame will never change. It may get smudged and gritty, but God will never hold you as an enemy. God's love for you is the ground and foundation of your selflove. This is the frame that teaches us to love our enemies and pray for those who hurt us. Practice makes perfect.



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
## Virtual Soup Suppers March 1, 8, 15 & 22





## **OUR FASCINATING FAITH**

#### Ashes

There are three major Biblical traditions concerning ashes: repentance, mourning, and mortality, and they are interrelated. Repeatedly throughout the Bible we encounter the use of ashes (often together with sackcloth) as a penitential practice. A similar practice is seen when someone is in mourning or distress. And ashes are a metaphor for human life, which is seen as brief and destined to end in death:

Ashes are the result of fire, the complete burning of something that was alive. They are ephemeral; the slightest puff of air can send them away into nothingness. It is easy to see how ashes came to symbolize fleeting human life or the humility of repentance.

Ashes can represent other things as well. For example, ashes are often used to fertilize our gardens and fields. Ash is therefore necessary to bring about and nourish life.

We can now begin to see how appropriate a symbol ashes are for the season of Lent. For Lent is not only a time of repentance, of sorrow for our sins. It is a baptismal season of preparation for the new life of our catechumens and of recalling the new life of our own baptism. We start Lent in ashes, and end it in Easter. What will the ashes mean to you this Lent?

#### **TEMPLE OF GOD**


When Paul writes "you are the temple of God," note that he uses the plural form of "you." He was speaking about the community at Corinth as a temple. For Paul, a temple is where God dwells. God abides, and is active within, the shared life of the community. Paul speaks at length about the divisions within the Corinthian community. These divisions were seen as a defilement of God's temple.

We encounter divisions in our own Church today, sometimes accompanied by a troubling lack of humility and charity. Often the conflicts revolve around establishing markers of true discipleship, with some emphasizing personal faith and morality, and others emphasizing justice and the Church's social teachings. Perhaps the Spirit, active in the temple of our shared life, points toward Jesus' command "love your enemies." Perhaps we best exhibit discipleship in the charity we extend, and our capacity for dialogue, with those who disagree with us or who are unkind to us.

#### **THE SERMON**

Today we conclude the series of Sunday Gospel passages from the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew's chapters 5–7. Having proclaimed the coming of the Kingdom, Jesus extensively described to his new community what life is like in this new realm, and the inner dispositions needed to enter into it. He exposed hidden places of the heart, especially those places that needed to be healed.

The Sermon is a huge challenge for us today. The Sermon pushes against our attempts to compromise what God summons us to be and to do. It challenges our deep desires to see ourselves as virtuous, and to resist God's desire to transform us. It reminds us that we are both loved by God and in need of God's help. As we anticipate the season of Lent, consider prayerfully reading the Sermon as a whole. We are invited to carefully explore our deeper motivations, to allow God to uncover and to heal our fears and our wounds.

#### LENTEN PREPARATION

Wednesday is Ash Wednesday—the beginning of Lent, an important time in the church year. The season of Lent is the forty days of preparation before the great feast of Easter.

Do you belong to a sports team? Play a musical instrument? Dance? Do gymnastics? In any of these activities you need to practice skills, learn to concentrate, and listen to your coach or instructor. You may even have to do extra work to prepare for a big event. If you don't do the work you will not be ready. The same is true for Lent. We make extra preparations for the great celebration of Easter.

The Church names three principal practices that we should perform every Lent. You can get a head start this year by planning with your family how you will do each one. They can be accomplished in many different ways, so it is important to decide which way is best for you and your family. Take the next two days to make a plan for Lent.



• *Prayer:* We prepare by praying more. During this Lent we will do some extra praying. As a family and individually, how will we do this?

• *Fasting:* We prepare by fasting more often. Fasting means doing without something—food, video games, TV, trips to the mall. When we fast from certain things we make more space in our lives for other things like prayer and good works. What will we do without this Lent?





• Almsgiving: We prepare by giving alms more freely. God commands us to give to the poor, not because we are rich but because we have received from God all that we have. Sharing with the poor enriches us in many ways. We each give to one another. As a family and individually, how will we share what we have with those in need?

# **DISCIPLES TOGETHER**

Today's readings reflect on our communal identity as disciples. Before we begin Lent together in a few days, we take time to appreciate what God has done by giving us our family of faith. In Leviticus, God tells Moses to "speak to the whole Israelite community" and give them instructions for living in love. Moses passes along the message-to each and every believer-that God's people must strive together for holiness. Saint Paul echoes this message, insisting that we are indeed God's holy children. As temples of the Spirit, we belong to Christ and to one another. This mutual belonging is a blessing and a challenge. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus sets a high bar for Christian community: his followers must love not only those who are easy to love, but also the people who upset us. Together, let us ask God to give us this kind of love.
