## From The Pastor

A month ago, the question was raised as to whether we should return the tabernacle to the sanctuary in Church. Discussions were had with the Adult Faith Formation commission, the Evangelical Charity Commission (formerly Christian service) and staff. In this year of Eucharist Renewal there was strong interest in this significant liturgical change.

Why the change and what does it mean? Following the conclusion of Vatican II, liturgical reforms included Mass in English with the priest facing the people. A more communal aspect of our gathering became the new focal point. Tabernacles were more often located in a side or daily Mass chapel, including space for reservation and adoration of the Sacrament. The focal point of the sanctuary has always been the altar upon which the living sacrifice of the Mass is offered. This remains the case today.

Why move the tabernacle now? Recent movements of liturgical practice have shown a renewed interest in having the tabernacle present in the main sanctuary. Church renovations or new builds are directed to locate the tabernacle in the main worship space. A primary motivation for us is to take advantage of this Eucharistic year of renewal in rebuilding the faith and reverence of the faithful in the Real Presence of the living Christ.

What does this mean for us practically? In the next few weeks, determined by the metrics and preparation needed, the tabernacle will be moved to the center of the main sanctuary space. While the altar remains the central focus as the table of sacrifice, the tabernacle is intended to enrich and focus our attention on the presence of the Lord as we prepare for Mass. This greater reverence and attention will necessarily include a greater reverence as we enter the church. A reverent bow or genuflection is most appropriate. Similarly, greeting one another and talking in church should become softer with attentive awareness of the presence of the Lord among us. Those seeking to pray should be able to do so without intrusive conversations. If it is evident a person is praying, conversations should seriously tone down or move to a more appropriate space.

This does not mean we return to the silence of the 1950's. It does mean that we are aware and attentive to the presence of the Lord as we enter church in preparation for Mass. Greeting one another is an important part of our community life. It should remain so in a quieter and more reverent tone.

Through the course of the year, I intend to preach on

Eucharistic themes that reveal the meaning and power of this living Sacrament of the Lord's presence. One example is that it is not uncommon that when we think of Jesus at Mass, on the altar, or in receiving our personal communion, we imagine Jesus on the Cross or in his dying. This is not wrong, because the death of Jesus on the Cross was real. He was crucified and he died. However, in the sacrifice of the Mass what we consecrate from simple bread and wine is the living, resurrected Christ. On the altar, through the consecration, the real living presence of the risen Lord is made present. He is not dead. He is alive and enthroned in heaven with the heavenly Father.

The risen Christ is no longer limited by time and space. Jesus is now eternal, ever-present in all time and in every place. The holy sacrifice of the Mass makes present the power of Good Friday in the dying of Jesus for the forgiveness of sins. On the altar through the calling down of the Holy Spirit, the living presence of the Resurrected Lord is made present. This is the power of the Sacrament that sustains us in faith. As we receive communion, we are consuming, taking into ourselves the living presence of the Risen Christ.

This is not a passive interaction. It is a mutual sharing of communion. As we receive in faith and reverence the living Christ, we are also received by Jesus into himself. This is what makes it communion; the mutual sharing and receiving of the other in a sacred exchange. This is the exchange and interaction of the Last Supper on Holy Thursday. It was living and real. Jesus loved his followers and never wanted to leave them. In the breaking of the bread and sharing of the cup, Jesus transforms bread and wine into his body and blood in a Sacrament that will endure until the end of the world. This Sacrament is a bond of love and commitment by Jesus that will never be broken. The life and person of Jesus is always with us and never more perfectly than in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

Please consider these changes and pray for the graces that will come to us in this exchange. Please pay attention to our upcoming offerings to enrich this year of renewal of the Holy Eucharist. Ask God to bless our gathering with a renewed and shared reverence for Jesus and one another as we enter our sacred space at Mass. Let the seed of the Eucharist that is Jesus, bear fruit in you at thirty or sixty or a hundred-fold. Imagine that! Be Jesus. Be Eucharist for others.

## 15<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a *relationship*, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.

## SOIL CONDITIONS

I am a hopeless gardener. I never met a plant I couldn't swiftly kill with good intentions and poor understanding of soil conditions.

Because really, it's all about the soil conditions — at least, that's what Google tells me when I helplessly search phrases like "Why aren't any of my seeds sprouting? Please, I tried so hard." I can never seem to match the right type of soil offering the right type of drainage and texture with the right plant. I can't understand why it's not enough to bury the seed in whatever ground is available, sprinkle some water and ask it, very nicely, to grow.

This is also a quality that makes me a poor evangelist to people who do not share my beliefs. How many times have I encountered a friend or loved one who left the faith, and I tried to coax them back by hurling Catechism passages in their direction, offering advice they never asked for and are ill-equipped to understand? I sow these seeds of witness and bang my fists in frustration that they rot where I plant them, never realizing that *it's all about the soil*.

It is Christ, and Christ alone, who works within the heart. It is Christ who is the sower of the seed, not me. When I leave him out of the equation, when I fail to offer the Person and instead only offer the teaching, I can anticipate that any witness I have to offer will rot where it is planted just as sure as a tulip bulb in a bed of clay.

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## Everyday Stewardship

Over the years I have wasted a lot: a lot of money, a lot of time, and a lot of talent. Sometimes I didn't realize I was wasting these things but, after reflection, I realized I could have done more and accomplished much greater things. Of course, I think that is part of our imperfect humanity. It truly is easier for us to waste our gifts than grow them into something more.

The parable of the sower speaks about the word of God that gets planted in our hearts. If the soil of our heart is rich, than the word will grow and change us. If that soil is rocky or full of weeds, the word will lie there without any impact, bearing no fruit.

This parable can be applied to living a stewardship way of life as well. As sowers, we have been given the seeds of our time, talent, and treasure. We have a choice of where to plant these gifts. As good everyday stewards, we are called to plant them wisely and prudently. Oftentimes it is not enough to simply give away what we have. We need to discern the best places to sow these gifts so the maximum harvest can grow. This takes prayer, reflection, and study. Without a solid discernment process, we can find ourselves sowing seeds endlessly without much to show for it. But joyful is the person who has used one's gifts wisely, for the bounty of the harvest is great.

# WHY DO WE DO THAT?

## CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### WHY USE INCENSE?

**Question:**

Why do we use incense at Mass?

**Answer:**

The use of incense in religious ceremonies and worship is a practice that predates Christianity, and which is also found in many other religious traditions today.

Incense, which is made from resin infused with aromatic spices and oils, is one of those fundamentally human symbols that incorporates more than one of our senses, helping us to reflect on realities that transcend the everyday details of our lives.

The use of incense in the Church's liturgy — in the Mass, as well as in devotions to the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours — is inspired by the use of incense in the Jewish tradition. In the writings of the Old Testament, we hear about incense being used in the worship of the temple, and Psalm 141 asks, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering" (vs. 2). The image here is that, as the incense gently rises to heaven, our prayers also rise to God as something sweet and pleasant.

Another ancient use of incense that has also become part of our Catholic tradition is the idea that when we incense something, it's because it is something special or sacred. This is why the Book of the Gospel is incensed during the Liturgy of the Word and the bread, wine, priest celebrant, and congregation are incensed at the presentation of the gifts. To this, we can also add the incensing of the Blessed Sacrament during eucharistic adoration and benediction, and the body of the deceased at the end of the Mass of the Resurrection (the Funeral Mass).

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## QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK FOR REFLECTION

**First Reading:** Is 55:10-11

The prophet Isaiah assured the Israelites who were exiled in Babylon that God's word is reliable and purposeful. How might you help friends or family trust more in God?

**Second Reading:** Rom 8:18-23

Paul sees creation itself sharing in the redemption and future glory that awaits all believers — "For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God." What do you imagine earth would look like filled with God's glory, absent any "corruption?"

**Gospel:** Mt 13:1-23 or 13:1-9

Over the next few Sundays, we will be hearing many parables from Jesus. Today's parable of the sower and the seeds speaks to how people react differently to the Good News of the kingdom of heaven. How would you describe your reaction to Jesus's parables of the kingdom?


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## Order of Christian Initiation of Adults

**GETTING TO KNOW OUR SAINTS...****OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL**  
**July 23****OUR LADY OF  
MOUNT  
CARMEL**

The origins of this feast reach all the way back to the Old Testament. In the book of Kings, we read the story of the prophet Elijah. Much of his prayer, fasting, and public ministry occurred from Carmel, a mountain in Israel. Christian hermits -- seeking solitude -- made their homes on the mountain during the first millennium. Over time, the hermits assembled into a community and were given a Rule of Life. They named their church after Mary -- Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Political upheaval forced the Carmelite order out of the Holy Land and into Europe, where they established monasteries for both men and women across the continent. Many great saints and doctors of the Church have come from the Carmelite order, including St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, St. Therese of Lisieux, and St. Edith Stein.

**ST. MARY MAGDALEN - JULY 22**

Mary Magdalene has been the subject of speculation and scholarship over the last 2,000 years. Mary Magdalene makes her first named appearance in Luke 8:2. She is one of several women following Jesus. Luke specifically mentions that Mary had previously been delivered from demonic possession. Whatever her life looked like before she met Jesus, it wasn't good! Because of this association with being a repentant sinner, Mary Magdalene has been associated with other similar stories in the Gospel, such as the woman caught in adultery or the woman who bathes Jesus' feet with her tears.

Mary Magdalene shows up again by name at the end of the Gospels, when she stands with the Blessed Virgin Mary at the foot of the Cross. Mary is also present in the garden of the resurrection. She is one of the women who goes to bring spices to Jesus' tomb, where they find the stone rolled away. Mary stays in the garden weeping, believing his body has been stolen. Jesus approaches her and calls her by name, and she becomes the first witness to the resurrection! While many of the details of Mary Magdalene's life have been lost to time, she is an example of powerful conversion, deep faith, and intimate love for Christ.

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
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
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
