From The Pastor

Today's gospel is foundational to the Christian life. More broadly, it can also serve as a path to a focused and meaningful life for all human beings. It appears to be focused on Jesus and his interest in who people think he is. It is that and so much more.

Jesus knows who he is. The reality of the question is less about Jesus and more about those who choose to become his followers. The fundamental question is one of identity. Secure in his own identity and actively on a path to fulfill the purpose of his life, Jesus presents the question of identity to his closest followers. Yes, Jesus is interested in what others think of him, and who they believe he is. Much more than a popularity survey, Jesus seeks to deepen the awareness of his identity in those who acknowledge him as the Son of God.

The question of identity is universal and timeless. It is an unavoidable question for each of us who seeks to live a focused and meaningful life. I still remember with some degree of clarity my early years in Junior High School. Identity was the focus of Religion class and faith formation. Who am I? Why do I exist? What is the meaning and purpose of my life? Consider these questions personally in your present stage of life. The definitive answer was not realized in middle school.

A parallel question quickly followed. Who is God? Why did God make me? How does God know me, and how do I come to know myself in God? Do I create my own identity? How do I know what my identity is, or if the identity I create is true for me? Basic as these questions are, they can be quite fruitful as I ponder the movements and call of my spiritual life.

Each of us has a particular and unique identity formed by the sum of our life experience. Some of this experience is good, some bad, some quite impactful, while much is forgettable. Personal identity changes and develops as we move through the various stages of life. This is true of our spiritual identity as well. A sense of self is formed early in life yet evolves as we are influenced by the rhythms of life.

This is the point of the Lord's question to the disciples. What impact is Jesus having on those who encounter him? Do people allow themselves to be influenced by the words and the works of Jesus? The question is not about Jesus, but rather about those who are drawn to him in faith and hope for a better life with God.

At this stage of your life, who do you say Jesus is? Take time to ponder this in a meaningful way. Easy and obvious answers will quickly come to mind. To actively connect Jesus to your personal identity deserves a considered response. You are really talking to yourself, feeling and perceiving within yourself the impact you allow Jesus to have on your life and way of being. Your answer will impact your relationships, your faith, and the effect faith will have on your identity.

An effective way to access this question Jesus poses is to reverse the question. As Jesus asks, 'who do people say I am?' we can ask Jesus, 'who do you say I am?' You can do this in a time of prayer or personal reflection. To listen to the Lord for his answer, you will gain a deeper sense of your personal and spiritual identity with Jesus.

What we have learned about God and come to believe through Jesus will help us perceive who Jesus may say we are. What have we learned about God and Jesus? God is love. Jesus is God. God loves us personally. God knows us intimately. Through the Incarnation, God became human in Jesus to share in the life we have. God gave us Jesus as Redeemer, Lord, Savior, Brother, and friend. Jesus chose to die for us that we would be free of sin, reconciled to God, and personally forgiven for our happiness and freedom to love ourselves and others. Jesus calls us his beloved ones. Jesus wants us to know and share in the communion of love he shares with the Father.

With these basic Christian truths, who would Jesus say you are? I believe Jesus would say, 'You are my beloved, my friend, my longing, my hope, and my desire. You are in me, and I am in you. I have your heart and I have given you my heart. You are my joy. I believe in you. I am your deepest identity, and I will be with you always. Come and share my Father's joy.'

Consider a similar time of pondering. See if you can set aside an immediate sense of self and look more deeply inside. Ask Jesus to speak to you like he spoke to Peter who made his profession of faith. God the Father inspired Peter with that act of faith, and it transformed his identity for the rest of his life.

Who do you say Jesus is and who does Jesus say you are? How is that reflected in the way you live your life on your way to the Kingdom of God?



Who Do You Say That I Am?

I once knew a very devout woman whose adult godchild had fallen away from the practice of the faith. This godchild still believed in God, and even felt a sense of belonging in the Church. He was a good and kind person. But poor catechesis and a society that confuses pleasure with joy had left him lax in practice, without an appreciation of the sacraments. He was making choices that threatened his soul.

His godmother wanted more for him. She planned to speak with him about his life, hoping to encourage him to return to the practice of the faith. She knew that, when she brought this up, he would reply that it wasn't important to attend Mass or to receive the Eucharist, that was all just "extra."

She told me that she was going to begin their conversation by asking him the question Jesus poses to Peter in Matthew 16:15 — the critical question in all our lives, the question whose answer will define what we become in this world and the next.

Her godson knew the answer. She was confident, unshakably, that he did. He may have forgotten it or ignored it. He may have tried to convince himself he wasn't entirely sure. He may have refused to give an answer. But he knew it. He knew the answer.

There is a reason that, after Peter's response, Jesus gives him the keys to the kingdom of heaven.

"Who do you say that I am?"

Let our whole lives be our answer.



WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

THE GIVING OF TREASURE

Question: Why are Catholics required to give money to the Church?

Answer: Offering money and other goods to God and the Church is, before all else, a statement of gratitude. We see this when we look at how our spiritual ancestors showed their gratitude to God for the gifts they had received (e.g. Genesis 14:18-20 and Genesis 28:16-22). One of the ways they offered thanks to God was through a practice called "tithing," in which 10 percent of a person's goods (crops, livestock, money, etc.) were given back to God.

Today, the practice of tithing — giving 10 percent — is still common in many Protestant communities, but it is not required for Catholics. Instead, the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that, "The faithful also have the duty of providing for the material needs of the Church, each according to [their] own abilities" (no. 2043). This means that, although we are not bound to practice "tithing" in the traditional sense, we do share a responsibility to share our money or other resources with our parish communities. Like our spiritual ancestors, we give as a sign of our gratitude for the many gifts that God has given to us. Beyond this, we also share our resources with other Catholic organizations to help them finance their ministries, to continue and grow their outreach to the poor and the needy, and to provide just wages for their employees.

How much we give depends on our individual circumstances, but since we share a responsibility for the programs, outreach, and health of our parish communities and Catholic organizations, this question gives us a wonderful opportunity to ask some important questions about the quality of our giving and what our priorities are. Remember, we are only stewards of our time, talents, and treasures and as the First Letter of Peter reminds us, "As each one of you has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied graces" (4:10).

Holiness Runs in the Family

and his friends drank, stole, and caroused throughout town. Monica never stopped praying for Augustine, no matter how far he strayed. Augustine became swept up in heresy, a false form of Christianity. He lived with a mistress and had a child out of wedlock. All the while, Monica kept praying. Conversion came slowly to Augustine, but at age 32, he was finally baptized. Augustine would go on to become a priest, then bishop, then world-renowned theologian whose works have stood the test of time. May St. Monica and St. Augustine inspire us to never stop praying for our loved ones.



THE PASSION OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST -AUGUST 29



"The Memorial of the Passion of Saint John the Baptist complements the Solemnity of his birth, celebrated on 24 June. John is the cousin of Jesus. He was conceived when his parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth, were elderly. Both his parents were descendants of

priestly families. John's birth took place about six months prior to that of Christ, and coincides with the Gospel episode of the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. The liturgical celebration of his martyrdom, which occurred between 31 and 32, has ancient origins. It was already celebrated in France in the 5th century, and in Rome the following century and can be traced to the dedication of a small basilica that dates back to the 5th century where he was buried in Sabaste in Samaria. Tradition holds it was on this day that his head was found. Pope Innocent II had it later transferred to Rome to the Church of Saint Sylvester in Capite.

The king promptly dispatched an executioner with orders to bring back his head. He went off and beheaded him in the prison. He brought in the head on a platter and gave it to the girl. The girl in turn gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body and laid it in a tomb. (MK 6:17-29)"


