From The Pastor

The Kingdom of God is often misunderstood as something we will experience in heaven. This is not the case. The Kingdom of God is the work Jesus began through the Incarnation. In Christ, God came to earth in the human-divine person of Jesus to bring the Divine reign into the world. Jesus worked tirelessly to reveal the true nature and identity of the living God. Jesus was very clear that to know him was to know the Father. To see him was to see the Father. To believe in Jesus was to believe in the Father through whom he was sent.

Jesus used every skill and talent he had as a human being to show us what a fully realized human being looks like. In the grace of his Divine nature, Jesus was not showing off how perfect a person he was. He was simply living up to the nature of his own being in the image of his Father's love. Jesus is showing us by his example all that is possible when we devote ourselves to live from our deepest truest nature as beloved sons and daughters of our Father.

Jesus also lived the way he did to honor and give glory to the Father. It was the deepest desire of Jesus to reveal the Father to the world. Jesus offered every ounce of himself in self-giving love to fulfill the Father's will. What is the will of the Father? That we become one with the Father through our faith in the Son whom He sent. Throughout his life, Jesus dealt with every tension and challenge of sin that we ourselves encounter. He was rejected, criticized, humiliated, called the Devil, and was ultimately killed. In the face of all these lies, Jesus responded to human sin and disorder with understanding, compassion, forgiveness, and mercy. Always with a call to conversion that humanity might awaken to the gift of God promised in our redemption.

This theme is shared in the readings today. At the end of the Church year, we are reminded of the necessity to prepare for the coming of the Lord. The tone is not one of anxiety and fear, but one of loving devotion with hopeful longing to finally meet the Lord face to face. We all know that death is inescapable and one day we will meet the Lord. In wisdom, the Church alerts us to live generously the ways of the gospel as modeled by Jesus so that on that eternal day we are readily received by the Lord our God.

The first reading offers an image of the faithful and resourceful wife. She is a prize to her husband not only in her love, but also for her effective and resourceful running of the household. She uses her skills wisely and generously with love and devotion to honor God in her

role as spouse and mother. Her skills turn a nice profit for the home even as she reaches out to the poor and the needy. The woman is an image of a mature person living in a way that honors God, serves others, and makes good use of her skills and talents. Her value is beyond any worldly treasure.

The gospel offers the same image with a different twist. Note that this is a parable. It is a story that causes us to ponder the mystery of God and his Kingdom. The verse is omitted today, but the parable begins with the common phrase, 'the Kingdom of God is like...' The Kingdom is like a rich man going on a long journey who distributes his wealth to others in the hopes it may grow in value in his absence. It is implied that Jesus is the rich man who leaves his skill set, talents if you will, to bring forth his Kingdom. The long journey is Jesus who ascended to heaven after the Resurrection. The talents are left behind so that we who profess his name might work as he did to bring his Kingdom into the world.

It could sound like Jesus is the CEO of Kingdom Coming Inc. This is not the case. That talents represent gifts of the Holy Spirit, Christian virtues given to each according to their ability. These talents are not small amounts. A talent would be comparative to a thousand dollars. The first person was given five talents. That is more money than anyone made in a year's salary. The point being, God has not left us empty handed to do the work of bringing his Kingdom to the world.

The tension is raised in how the talents are used, or not. The faithful disciple will bear good fruit multiplying what has been given. The Master is honored and his work accomplished whereby this servant is given even more to bear greater fruit.

The last servant is given only one talent. God is ready to use all of us who profess his name, each to our ability. The one talent is not stingy, it is prudent. *Everyone* has some talents or gifts of the Spirit as a person of faith. This last servant lived in fear and laziness. His talent bore no good fruit, only returned after safe keeping. This approach gains a strong reaction from the Master. What this one had, likely unaware, was taken away and given to the one with five talents.

The message is obvious. God has blessed each of us abundantly, even in ways we have yet to realize. Too many live selfish self-contained lives. Search your life. What spiritual gifts do you have that the world needs? All the gifts are needed to bring about the Kingdom. Do not simply return them to God unused. The Giver of the gifts has strong feelings about that.



Tips to Help Seniors Get Enough Water Throughout the Day

Water is essential for keeping our bodies functioning correctly. Dehydration is one of the most frequent causes of hospitalization for persons over 65. This is due to the decrease in kidney function, body water content, and less ability to notice changes in temperature, and a decreased sense of thirst.

Dehydration can cause weakness, fatique, dizziness, headaches, confusion, forgetfulness, elevated heart rate, and constipation. Warning signs of dehydration include feeling tired or dizzy, thirst, darker urine, headaches. dry mouth, or increase in temperature, breathing, and heart rate.

To help you get enough water throughout the day ask your doctor what your fluid amounts should be as some people have heart failure or kidney disease and would have some restrictions. Do not wait until you are thirsty, always keep a container of water at hand. You can always add flavors to the water in the form of fruits, vegetables, or flavored drink mix. Drink a variety of fluids to stay hydrated. Juice, decaffeinated beverages, soups, and vegetables all offer fluids. For a treat you might try smoothies, frozen juice pops, Italian ices or sorbet to help you meet your goals. Remember dehydration starts before you get thirsty! Angela Mavnard Parish Nurse

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

Anointing of the Sick

Question: If it isn't only for people who are dying, when should someone receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick?

Answer: One of the unfortunate realities in the Church today is that so few people understand the meaning and value of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, largely because so many people still mistakenly think of this sacrament as "Last Rites" or "Extreme Unction."

In his life and ministry, Jesus healed the sick. In this sacrament, the Church continues the healing mission of Jesus and, in hope, prays that God will grant healing to the person who is suffering. But even if there is no physical healing, the sacrament offers spiritual healing through the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. And so, anyone who is living with serious illness (including emotional or psychological illness) and the elderly are encouraged to celebrate this sacrament when it is needed.

The ritual for Anointing of the Sick does also include special prayers and blessings for those who are facing death, including viaticum (communion given to the dying, trusting that the Lord Jesus will be their companion along the way, as they make their final journey).



wedding. She confessed her promise of

virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her. Valerian would honor her vow only if

he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians. Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wounding her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.


Kindness- Week 2

33RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

When I was a kid, I hated playing Monopoly because my siblings and friends always seemed to win. But worse was how it happened. Scared to risk my fake money on buying properties, I'd hold on to it. My opponents hungrily bought up the various real estate squares on the board. Then, inevitably, my poor, low-equity self would land on their spots, pay them rent, and my money would drain to zero. It seemed so unfair. The rich get richer, and the poor get poorer. I had to learn that monopoly money is meant to be spent. I was scared to lose some of it. So, I lost all of it.

How do we see what we possess? Jesus' parable about the talents is not really about economics but about the investability of everything he entrusts to us. How marvelous that everyone in the fable who places talents in the open market doubles their investment. The only one who doesn't is the man who fearfully buries his one talent. Jesus' success strategy for us seems to be, whatever we have, *get it out of our possession*. Risk it as quickly and as fully as we can.

You and I have precious gifts. We have valuable things to invest — time, talents, treasure. The Lord invites us to be brave and even somewhat reckless, to give as much away as possible. If we give it away in the direction of love and truth, it will grow. If we hold on to it in fear, the little we have will be taken away. Let me challenge you this week: find something in your life you're holding on to, and risk it by giving it away. It won't double if you hold on to it.
