#### From The Pastor

In church and religion, we use the words call and conversion. Both call and conversion are important movements in the spiritual life that lead to maturing faith and love for God. What these words mean in a mature spiritual sense is not often what is generally accepted in common human understanding.

In the best sense of the word, conversion is an encounter or awakening through a rich experience that leads to a new awareness and desire for God. True conversion awakens an inner love, a motive, and desire to change one's life in the awareness of the living presence of God. Conversion is different than but related to repentance. The call to repent is to change one's mind and/or the direction of one's life in response to an experience of God. Moved by an experience of conversion through grace, a person will often repent and change their thinking and even their way of acting.

In the lesser sense, conversion is often thought of something I must do to turn from sin to avoid the risk of God's punishment. Conversion is thought of as an act of my will, through my self-determination and hard work to be a better person in the eyes of God or others. It is something I do to avoid punishment, to be worthy of heaven, or to gain God's favor. In themselves, none of these are bad things, but they are not conversion and they will not lead to a deeper relationship with God. Why not? Because they are motivated by human will through personal efforts to gain God's good favor. They are not often motivated by love, but by what I believe I must do to attain or deserve God's blessing, love, or favor.

Divine love is always a free gift, never dependent on human performance. Consider, 'God is love and those who live in love live in God and God lives in them.' I John 4:16. God's call or identity in a person flows from this gift of love. True spiritual conversion is motivated and animated by an awakening to this love. Consider the difference: when you married you were motivated by the love you felt for and received from your beloved. In receiving that love, you desired to give your love in return to the one who loved you. Right? Do not look for perfection here, but structure. Look from the other side. You did not marry your spouse through an act of your will motivated by your self-determination with the expectation to serve your needs and wants. If you did, the marriage would not last or would bear only unfulfilled love. Right? Love is realized only in a willing surrender to the other motivated for the sake of love.

Consider the difference between the conversion of Jonah in the first reading, and the call of Andrew and Peter with James and John in the gospel. Jonah is in relationship with God and seeks to follow a Divine call.

God calls Jonah to preach a message of conversion to the violent and warring Ninevite's. Jonah hates the Ninevites because they conquered the Northern kingdom of Israel and sent any survivors of the conquest into exile. Jonah sets his will against the will of God. His desire is not directed by love, but by his anger and hatred for this abusive nation. The will of Jonah overrides the will of God. Jonah's will to serve God is determined by his desire for God to destroy his enemies. The larger story of Jonah is not included today. Today's account is God's second call after Jonah's encounter in the belly of a whale for three days. Still resisting, Jonah finally does as God calls and his work is completely effective. Why? Jonah surrendered his will and expectation and did as God had directed. Not perfect, he still did not like it, but in reverence (love) of God Jonah obeyed and accomplished God's will.

The call of the early disciples is different. Why did they so immediately follow Jesus? This was not their first encounter with Jesus. There were several previous engagements with him. Why did they follow him? Their hearts were stirred and drawn by the conversion of love. Something in Jesus moved them deeply enough that they could not help themselves but to follow. They did not follow Jesus with a willful intention of personal gain. They were drawn by a love they could see and feel but could neither understand nor resist. Their hearts were grasped by an unseen love that was beyond any willful interest on their part. This is conversion at its finest. A surrendered yes to a love that grips the soul.

Conversion and the call of God are not determined by our willful desire, agenda, or expectation. Movements toward God that lead to spiritual growth are realized through willing desire for love alone. Because humans do not surrender easily, love is the only true motivation worthy of our personal surrender to another person or to Divine love. Otherwise, it is only for the sake of getting what I believe I need or want. There is no 'I' in God. God is a relationship of self-giving love.

Love is the true motivator of change. Look back on your life and consider the events, people, or experiences that you willingly surrender to for the sake of love, relationship, service, or self-giving. Marriage, children, the suffering or need of a loved one, actions of mercy or forgiveness come to mind. Next, do the same with God. What experiences, great or small, have lifted you beyond yourself stirring a love for God with a desire to surrender to God's purpose in love. Resistance is inevitable, for good reason or bad. In the end, three things will last; faith, hope, and love, and the greatest of these is love.



Intergenerational Healing Mass

### What is intergenerational healing?

We all understand the concept of material inheritance. After people die, they often leave money, property and possessions to family members.

We are also aware of a physical inheritance. Doctors always ask for the family medical history of a new patient. There is also a spiritual inheritance. We can thank God and family for the benefit from our virtuous ancestors going back a thousand generations (see Sirach 44:10-12). We are also adversely affected by the sins of parents, grandparents and great-grandparents and by the sins of the ancestors, who adversely affected them, with consequences that may extend to what is inherited materially, emotionally and physically.

In his book entitled *Intergenerational Healing*, Fr. Robert De Grandis writes: "intergenerational healing is, for the Christian, an opportunity to recognize and bring healing to family influences from the past, with implications for the future. Intergenerational healing suggests the possibility that negative acts and deeds of our ancestors can somehow enter our "bloodstream" and take a toll on future generations. Transforming the connection with these troublesome roots is what intergenerational healing is all about. It's an exciting, fascinating area of the healing ministry."





### 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

We start telling lies around the age of three, the experts tell us. It's understandable. Lying is a god-like power. Whatever I want, I need only say it, and the world rearranges itself accordingly. It's amazing at first. But soon reality snaps back and I'm faced with a dilemma. If I remain committed to my lie I start to fracture into pieces. My words and reality drift apart, and I find myself lost in a lonely world of further falsehoods and fear of being found out.

How marvelous, then, that Jesus begins his ministry by proclaiming: "Repent!" We tend to think it means "stop doing bad things" but it doesn't. It literally means "go beyond the mind you have." Think in a new way. It's painful to admit, but some portion of my mind is addicted to lie-telling, usually to protect my ego or make life easier. To repent means to admit this tendency, to say, "I'm done lying," and to move beyond my split mind into a complete commitment to the truth. Perhaps that's why at Mass we together proclaim, "I have sinned in my thoughts, and in my words..." Repentance and truth-telling work together.

Those who know the twelve-step process of addiction recovery know this process well. The fourth step requires radical truth-telling: listing our moral defects. This isn't being scrupulous. Rather it is freedom from falsehood, and entrance into the real world. This week, I invite you to join me in this practice. Get your phone or piece of paper. Answer the question: what are your true moral defects? Write them down. Remember, the Lord knows them already and loves you. We have a sacrament where this truth-telling is celebrated: Confession. Perhaps it is finally time to go beyond our childish lies.

#### **Does God Forgive Abortion?**

**Question:** Can a person (the mother, father, or provider) ever be forgiven for an abortion?

**Answer:** For people of faith, any conversation of human sinfulness should always lead us to reflect on God's loving mercy. Because God's mercy is greater than any sin, the Church is clear that even those involved in the sin of abortion can be reconciled with God and the Church. To help make this grace more available through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, Pope Francis extended the permission to absolve someone of the sin of abortion to all priests in 2016.

Even with the grace and blessings of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the tragedy of abortion and the aftermath of abortion takes a toll on everyone involved. Ministries of outreach and support, such as Project Rachel, offer pastoral counseling, support groups, retreats, and other forms of care. #### **EUCHARISTIC SAINTS SERIES**



St. Juliana of Cornillon (1193-1258)

St. Juliana of Cornillon also known as St. Juliana of Liège, was born near modern-day Liège, Belgium. When she was 5 years old,

she and her twin sister became orphans. Following the deaths of their parents, the sisters were entrusted to the care of the Augustinian nuns at Mont-Cornillon. Growing up among the religious, Juliana's spiritual journey flourished. At age 13, she entered the order.

Juliana's profound love for Christ in the Eucharist was ignited during her time at the convent. She regularly participated in Mass and spent hours in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. In her prayers, she often experienced mystical visions, reinforcing her belief in the real presence of Jesus in the consecrated bread and wine.

Driven by her desire to see a dedicated feast to honor Christ in the Eucharist, St. Juliana took it upon herself to promote the idea fervently. She eventually became the Prioress of the canonry and frequently confided in her mentor, Canon John of Lausanne, telling him about her visions and her hope for the feast. He shared her experiences with his contemporaries, including Pope Urban IV.

Though Juliana died in 1258, her cause won over Pope Urban IV. In 1264 he issued the papal bill "<u>Transiturus de hoc mundo</u>" which instituted the Feast of Corpus Christi on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. The feast aimed to celebrate and affirm the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist, emphasizing the significance of the Blessed Sacrament in the life of the Church.

Juliana was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1869 and is remembered not only for the pivotal role she played in establishing the Feast of Corpus Christi, but for her musical talents, teachings, and writings. St. Juliana of Cornillon, pray for us!



#### THE IMPORTANCE OF READING SCRIPTURE

The following is an excerpt from The Power of the Word A Pastoral Note from Archbishop Allen Vigneron on Sacred Scripture(2021)

"Reading Scripture is not like reading any other book, because Scripture is a living word through which God speaks to each of us personally, right here and now. 'In the sacred books, the Father who is in heaven meets His children with great love and speaks with them.' (Vatican II *Dei Verbum* 21) God reveals his heart to us and he longs for us to respond from our hearts. When we read Scripture prayerfully, it becomes a dialogue of love. We listen to God's heart through his word and we respond from our heart in prayer.

Christian tradition developed the practice of lectio divina as a way to exercise this kind of prayerful reading. Lectio divina traditionally consists of four simple steps:

Reading (lectio): Read a passage of Scripture slowly and attentively.

Meditation (meditatio): Meditate on the passage, turning it over in your mind and connecting it with other passages in the Bible.

Prayer (oratio): Respond to God in prayer, telling him your thoughts, questions, hopes, fears, and desires as they relate to the passage.

Contemplation (contemplatio): Rest in God, enjoying his presence and receiving his love.

Christian tradition has developed other helpful ways for us to listen attentively to God speaking to us through his Word. The spiritual exercises of St. Ignatius, in which we use our imagination to place ourselves within the scene of a biblical story, is a particularly effective way to incorporate Scripture into our prayer.

As we study Scripture prayerfully, it shapes our relationship with God, which in turn shapes our whole life: our values, judgments, desires, words, and actions. Even though it was written thousands of years ago, Scripture addresses the challenges of our time. God's word speaks to family life, education, commerce, social justice, deadly pandemics, racial and political tensions, and living as God's people in a world that is too often hostile.

In times of uncertainty and turmoil, it is all the more essential to be nourished on Scripture every day. God's word becomes an anchor for our souls. We begin to see everything in this life in its true light: as passing away in preparation for our final destiny."
