From The Pastor

The story of the Rich Young Man is timeless and universal. Why? In one way or another, the story is a mirror or an image of the lives of so many of us. For many people, the story is easily dismissed because the young man is rich. Most people are not rich, so they do not strongly identify with the story. Even those who are rich in the wealth and goods of the world may not see themselves as rich knowing others who are richer than they. Money and wealth are funny that way. More than enough never seems to be enough.

The overall theme today is wisdom. Wisdom as a spiritual truth is only known in God. Wisdom is the Spirit of God; the Spirit of love that directs the mind and heart of the believer. Wisdom is the way, the truth, and the life of Jesus. Those who follow Jesus wholeheartedly will come to know this. Wisdom is the seedbed of inner peace that has found the pearl of great price for which all is sold to attain it. The path may be difficult, but the inner peace of wisdom secures the way.

The rich young man is a good person who seeks the way of God. Notice the man's excitement running up to Jesus, kneeling before him and asking his question. He desires to know the way to inherit eternal life. This is a universal human longing. We all want to know the answer to this question. Jesus directs him through the Commandments to which he confidently affirms his fidelity. He has followed all the rules and happy to say so.

This young man seems to miss that Jesus looks at him with love, loving him, and seeing in him a deep desire for the truth of God. Seeing this goodness in the man, Jesus shares this wisdom: "Go sell what you have and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come and follow me." Jesus wants the goodness of this man's heart to share in the work of the gospel. Jesus acts on his love for him, saying "come, follow me." Be one with us.

In what seems a stunning contradiction, the man walks away sad for the sake of his many possessions. What happened? Where did his zeal for God go and his desire to inherit eternal life? Simple answer is that he loved and depended on his possessions more that he could trust in the way of God. What does this story say to you? How might this interaction have something to do with you or me?

Everyone has a 'one thing.' For the rich man it was money and possessions. Is there one thing that

would tempt you to walk away from God, sadly?

To believe in God and find the joy of Divine wisdom means that God is number one. God is our inner center. God becomes the deepest identity and purpose that motivates all movements and actions of life. God cannot be one more tool in the tool belt of life so we can fix and figure out our own way. Note in the opening question of the rich man, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" On his own, the man can do nothing, least of all find his own way to God.

Like the rich man, what might be your 'one thing' that hinders a full and trusting surrender to God's invitation? For some, it is reputation, ego, or success. For others, its security and control against fear and vulnerability. Still others, self-sufficiency, the need to do it themselves, refusing the need for others. Some resist giving up the life they have made for themselves, by themselves. We all have favorite comforts, conveniences, pillows, jackets, jewelry, or various keepsakes. We all know in the gift of wisdom (first reading) gold is a little sand, and 'silver is accounted mire.'

I cannot help but think of those in the ravages of hurricane Helene. All of life changed. The security and stability of daily life disappeared. For too many, the immediate reality is survival; food, water, shelter, loved ones. Even in the reality of their despair, the greater number have turned to God. I have heard in many of the accounts and videos: 'at least we are alive,' 'God spared us.' 'God protected us.' 'We did not lose anyone. We all got out safe.' 'Thanks be to God.'

Wisdom is not only finding yourself but in finding yourself you find God at your center and realize you are home. You know you are not alone; that you belong to God. Belonging to God you realize your life is not your own but is for those who enter and pass through your life. This is the joy and the fruit of wisdom. Walking away sad would never cross your mind.

Did the rich man ever come back to Jesus? I heard it said that the rich man was Matthew the tax-collector who finally came to Jesus. Some say it was Zacchaeus the tax-collector who accepted and surrendered to the Lord's invitation. Could that be true? What about you?

If you discover a 'one thing,' offer it to Jesus and see what he can do with it. Full hearted faith in the power of Jesus learns the way to eternal life.

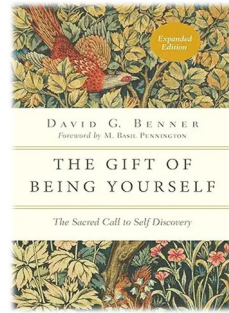

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

LORD'S PRAYER

Question: Why don't Catholics add the "For yours is the Kingdom ..." prayer at the end of the Our Father like Protestants do? Where did it come from?

Answer: The conclusion of the Lord's Prayer that you refer to is called a doxology, which is a prayer of glory and praise. This particular doxology we do use in the Mass. After the Our Father, the priest prays the prayer that begins, "Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil..." and the people respond with the doxology. The doxology is not found in the Bible, but it is very ancient. It was first found in *The Didache*, also called "The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles," which dates probably from about the year AD 90. It was a letter of instruction to early converts to Christianity. Protestantism dates only to the sixteenth century, so the doxology is actually a Catholic prayer. Some scholars and the catechism (#2760) indicate that the doxology was connected to the celebration of the Eucharist and was not used apart from it.

Remember, both the Lord's Prayer and the Eucharist were part of the "mysteries of faith," things taught only to believers. Ironically, a remnant of a prayer used during the celebration of the Eucharist has come to be used widely by many Christian churches that do not celebrate the Eucharist! Truth is indeed stranger than fiction!

Jesus taught his followers that excessive wealth and possessions can impact one's priorities in life. What are some practical ways to keep Jesus as a top priority in your life?

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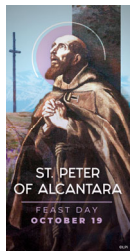

GETTING TO KNOW OUR SAINTS



ST. PETER OF ALCANTARA FEAST DAY OCTOBER 19 1499-1562

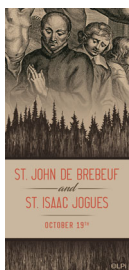
St. Peter of Alcantara was born in Alcantara, Spain in 1499. His father was the Governor of the province and his mother came from a noble family. He was privately tutored and attended the University of Salamanca. After he returned home from university, he was accepted as a Franciscan Friar of the Stricter Observance in 1515. He was ordained as a priest in 1524 and in 1525 he became Guardian of the friary of St. Mary of the Angels.

Throughout his life, St. Peter of Alcantara took up his spiritual cross and preached with great success to the poor, but also spent much of his time in solitude. From 1553 to early 1555, he spent this time alone in meditation and prayer. Soon following, St. Peter made a pilgrimage to Rome, barefoot the entire way. While in Rome he obtained permission from Pope Julius III to establish friaries.

St. Peter was known for frequently experiencing ecstasy, a state where he was entirely consumed with the warmth and light of the Holy Spirit. These euphoric moments were common during his prayer and meditation.

When he was near death, St. Peter took to his knees and prayed. When he was offered water, he refused it, saying, "Even my Lord Jesus Christ thirsted on the Cross." He died while in prayer on October 18, 1562. On April 18, 1622, he was declared blessed by Pope Gregory XV and later canonized by Pope Clement IX on April 28, 1669.

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The Feast of Ss. Isaac Jogues and Jean de Brebeuf & Companions OCTOBER 14

This week, we honor courage in the face of suffering, persecution, and sacrifice. October 14th is the feast of the first North American martyrs. Most famous among them is Isaac Jogues. The young priest left his role as college professor in France to become a missionary to the Huron tribe in what is now the northeastern United States. Fr. Jogues was captured by a warring tribe of Iroquois. He escaped just over a year later but not unscathed. Several of his fingers had been removed during torture in captivity. He returned to France, only to sail back to the New World, where he was later martyred. Fr. Jogues was one of eight Jesuit priests martyred over a seven-year period. They knew the dangers, yet pressed forward in love for Christ and his people. May we be inspired by their courage!

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Possessions

When I was a kid, before smartphones and Amazon, it was the toy catalogs that we waited for.

They arrived in the mail, smiling children's faces splashed across the cover, like a silent promise that real happiness could be purchased within these magical pages. We fought over who got to look at them first. We imagined playtime with this Barbie or that Easy Bake Oven.

Without realizing it, we expected that these toys — and the fun they would create out of thin air, the excitement they would inject into our days — would give us new lives. Make us new people.

The toys we did get were fun enough, but they never made us new people. They never gave us new lives. And before long they broke or needed new batteries. They lost their allure, and they went to the attic. And then, many years later, when we got married or moved houses, we found them, and we sighed — more junk to get rid of.

It's the same now, thirty years later, as much as I hate to admit it. The catalogs have become social media, and the toys have become promotions or pay raises or home improvement projects. I scroll through the feed and my mind lights up. *What if we had this? What if we could buy that? What if we could go there?*

The rich young man was not sad as he walked away from Jesus because he was losing his riches. He was sad because he wasn't — because he *couldn't*. He couldn't give them up. Such is the dark magic of materialism: it takes hold when you're not looking. He thought he was being a good person and doing good things. But he had given his heart away, and he hadn't given it to God. And now he couldn't get it back.

Whatever of this world we seek to possess — dollars, cars, clothes, prestige — will come to possess us, in the end.

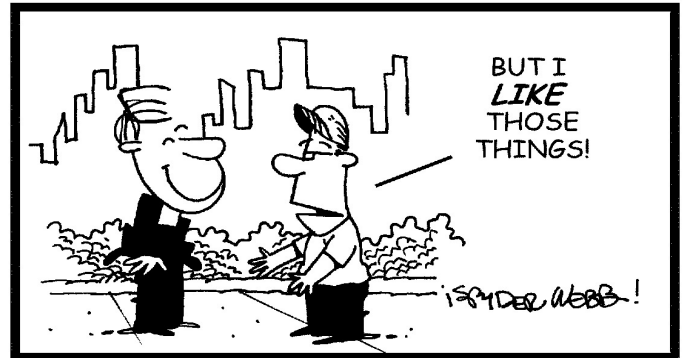
