From The Pastor

Flowing from the gospel of last Sunday that calls us to love God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength, how do we give God our all? What might that even look like? In a monetary, consumer, media, superficial driven culture, how do we learn to direct our lives fully to the life of Christ? To support this insight, ponder how we may more fully realize *all* God has given to us in the Lord Jesus.

Today's readings offer living examples of what surrendering our lives to God may look like. The faith and trust of the widow of Zarephath is stunning. Her life is in the crisis of a three-year drought. She is poor, alone without a husband or other forms of support. She appears resigned to death with her son after a final meal of bread and water.

The Prophet Elijah appears. It is not made clear, but she must recognize him as a man of God. Elijah is Jewish believing in Yahweh as the one true God. The woman is a Gentile of unknown religion. God has sent Elijah purposely to this woman and her son. Elijah is unfazed by the circumstance. He simply goes about his business as directed by God. He is in the custom of knowing and trusting God whole heartedly. Why does the woman even give this man a second thought? Maybe it is the weight of fear in her crisis. Maybe it is her only hope to trust the Prophet who promises the flour and oil will not run out. She surrenders all to the man of God and is not left in want.

The widow in the gospel is the same, but in a different frame. She knows God and deeply believes and loves God with all she has. She is not in crisis. She appears to be acting freely and with willful desire when she offers her last two cents to God. Her faith, love, and trust in God is complete. Her place in the Kingdom of God is assured at the word of Jesus who affirms loving devotion.

These are two images of what it looks like to give God our all. Most, if any of us, have not encountered the experience or response of these two women. What might this kind of trust look like in your life? In the reasonable security and stability most of us enjoy, how might we come to trust with such an ardent faith that acts with total and willing surrender?

The second reading offers us the opportunity to consider the trust and complete surrender of the Lord Jesus. How can we realize more fully all God gives us in the person of Jesus? The gift God offers through the Incarnate Son is a pure act of Divine love. Human perception and understanding cannot fathom the measure and capacity of this kind of love. It is a love

that can only be perceived through faith; a living faith confirmed through felt experience of personal encounters. The redemptive work of God through the Lord Jesus is an act of love that can only be satisfied and fulfilled by God. It is a sacrifice so perfect it never needs to be repeated. Jesus offers his own blood, his own life, once for all. Emphasis on all. Inclusively, every human being who ever existed or will ever exist is offered the gift of redemption through the Lord Jesus.

To give our all to the mystery of this loving sacrifice we are called to become mindfully conscious and heartfully attentive to the person and the life of Christ. With conscious attention and heartfelt faith, we are to ponder who Christ is as the God of our faith. We must ponder deeply what he does, why he does it, and what the effect his life has on us. The obvious: Jesus is the Son of the Divine God, he died out of love to save us from sin and death, that we may share the union of Divine love in the glory of heaven. Just a string of words we have all heard before? Hardly. Why do we so ardently believe in Jesus, hope in him, and long for what he promises? Because God has sown this longing in our hearts. We are more than animated physical bodies. We are spiritual beings in whom the Lord Jesus dwells in the power of his Spirit.

Our response? Allowing, forming, practicing gratitude as a primary and consistent stance of self-identity. Your life is God's gift; a gift God dearly loves to offer you, and from which God takes great delight. This is not only life here, but with the promise of life hereafter in perfect union with God in heaven. Can you believe this in an actively mindful and heartfelt way? Can you trust this in good times and in bad, through thick and thin, in the best or the worst days?

To know yourself in a stance of gratitude will deeply enrich your knowledge and awareness of God. You will not only learn to love yourself, but you will also grow in faith and trust in those around you. You will begin to see God in others and be moved to reach out beyond yourself toward the needs of others.

Living in gratitude for the gift of God given in Christ will draw you to works of justice, tolerance, and charity toward others. You will be more accepting of others no matter who they are. This is a lifetime journey, but you will be on your way to loving God with your whole self.

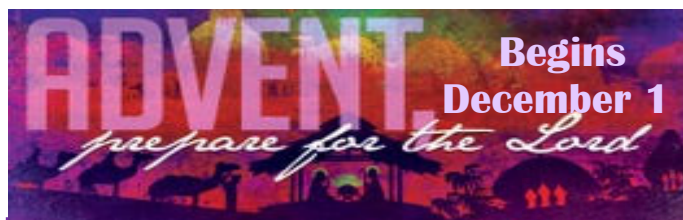

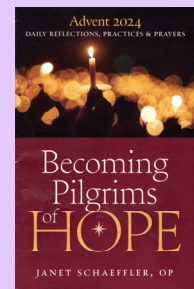

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

SAINTS

Question: Our prayer group has been reading the lives of some saints, and we were struck by how some of them thought they were such sinners. Why would such holy people think they had such serious sin?

Answer: Professional athletes practice the fundamentals of their sport over and over again, reaching for better form, consistency, and better performance. They focus on the basics, review past performances, and visualize greater success. Practice makes better, if not perfect!

Spiritual masters such as the saints also looked for perfection. They practiced their faith in the search for holiness, grace, and virtue. Through sacraments, prayer, study, good works, and penance, they raised their level of awareness, their sensitivity to the presence of God, the demands of the Gospel, and the workings of the Holy Spirit. They examined their consciences daily, reviewing the day for moments of failure and times that they could have been more virtuous in one way or another. They resolved to do better, be more attentive and alert!

Therefore, anything that would distract them or interfere with their relationship with God would be like a small black spot on a bright white wall — you can't miss it! The great saints were aware of sin and the presence of evil because they were so tuned in to the struggle between good and evil that was fought in their own lives, hearts, and souls. We must guard against becoming desensitized to sin in our lives and unaware of the harm it causes us. A goal of any spiritual practice is to become more aware of our sinfulness so that we seek God's forgiving and healing love.

So, what will Thanksgiving be like for you this year? You have some time to make it something more than it has been in the past. The choice is yours.

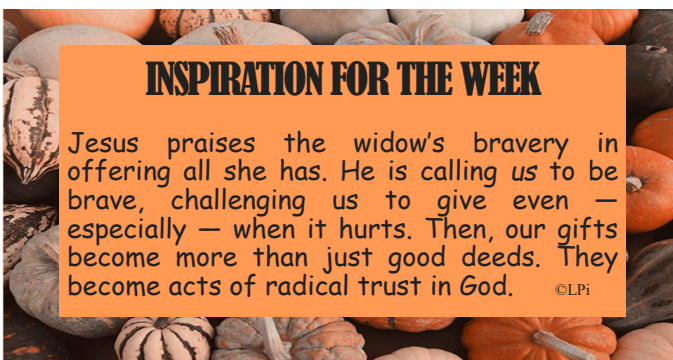

GETTING TO KNOW OUR SAINTS



ST. STANISLAUS KOSTKA
NOVEMBER 13
 1550-1568

St. Stanislaus Kostka was born to a noble family in Rostkow, Poland, not far from Warsaw. In 1564 Stanislaus was sent with his older brother to study at the new Jesuit college in

Vienna. He was an excellent student and developed a strong faith. He became a member of the Fraternity of St. Barbara, who believe their patroness will bring them Communion at the time of their death.

During his time in Vienna, while lodging with a Protestant nobleman, Stanislaus became seriously ill. Believing he was near death he asked for the Blessed Sacrament, but the noble man would not allow a priest or the sacrament to enter his house. Stanislaus had a vision of St. Barbara and two angels who gave him the Eucharist. Miraculously, he soon recovered from the illness. Stanislaus decided to enter the Jesuit order, however, he was unable to enter the monastery in Vienna. He disguised himself to avoid any objections from his family and walked to Dillingen, Germany where he met St. Peter Canisius the Jesuit leader there. After a short time, he was sent on to Rome, continuing the journey on foot.

He finally entered the Society of Jesus in Rome on his 17th birthday (October 28, 1567). According to all accounts, he was a model religious, taking on the lowly tasks of a new member despite his noble upbringing. But his time as a Jesuit was short. After only ten months in the order, just a few months shy of his eighteenth birthday, he died on the feast of the Assumption of Mary, August 15, 1568.

He was canonized on December 31, 1726, and is the patron of Jesuit novices, students, and Poland. St. Stanislaus Kostka, pray for us!

If you're like me, and you're far, far below the "having buildings named after you" tax bracket, you might just think that today's Gospel has nothing to do with you.

You might kick back and relax, thinking of all the poor, rich suckers sitting in the pews, shifting uncomfortably as Jesus praises the meager gift of the widow and disdains those who only give from abundance, those whose charity results in admiration and praise and all manner of temporal reward.

"In this economy, every gift I give is from my poverty," you might think to yourself with a chuckle.

But you — and let me be clear, I'm talking mostly to myself here — would be wrong. Because we all have an abundance of something, even if it isn't money.

What I've come to realize about myself is that I find plenty of ways to give *only* from my abundance. For instance, if I answer any request with the words, "Sure, I can, but..." chances are high that I'm about to work out a way to give, but only in a way that doesn't really impact me.

I'm willing to help. I just don't want to feel it.

But here's the thing about Jesus: he cares what's in our hearts as well as what's in our hands. A good deed, an act of charity? That's great! But what's the story behind it? Because a world full of moral actions and selfish hearts doesn't do anyone any good.

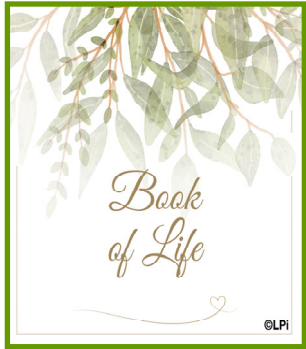
When we give from our poverty — our poverty of money, our poverty of time, our poverty of patience — we are giving the gift of the widow.

Once at an evening Mass as a poor college student, the collection basket was fast approaching, and I only had a ten-dollar bill. I was planning on using that to buy my favorite Chipotle burrito that night for dinner. Should I keep the money? Who would know if I did? If I gave it away, what would I eat? Would I be okay? I kissed my future burrito goodbye, dropped the money in the basket, and winced. But strangely, the rest of the Mass I felt more engaged than usual. I had skin in the game. I left the Mass excited to see how God would take care of me. And he did, in amazing ways.

When the poor widow places two copper coins in the temple treasury, Jesus doesn't pity her. He praises her. He blesses her. He brags about her. He celebrates her as the temple's largest benefactor. Her giving is an act of radical, concrete trust in God. It is as if she is entering a new level of giving that excites Jesus, because she contributes not out of her abundance, but she gives "everything she had."

What a challenge this is to each one of us! How easy it is to ignore this! But imagine the eruption of the energy of faith, hope, and love that would be unlocked if our financial sacrifices to the Church actually tapped into daily bread and not only our disposable income. I challenge us to try this in some way this coming week and see what happens in our hearts. Even if it costs us a burrito.
