### **From The Pastor**

The second Sunday of Easter is an optimal time to celebrate Mercy Sunday. Mercy is on full display in all its animation, motivation, and inspiration realized in the presence of the risen Lord. Mercy is the love of God in action that heals, restores, and animates the lives of those who embrace its truth. The journey to a full and surrendered trust in the risen Lord can be a long and rough road through many bouts of doubt and fear. The tension and reality of these human emotions confirms for us that Divine mercy is not simply a concept of the bible or a detached theology. Mercy is realized and experienced in the person of the Lord Jesus; the Divine God now risen from the dead. Mercy is personally experienced in human encounters in need of healing and forgiveness.

The disciples of Jesus are in a time of crisis and loss. Huddled in the fear and shock through the devastating loss of Jesus on the Cross has them hiding behind locked doors. The image is a visceral one that each of us can readily feel and empathize with. These men and women, so full of hope and promise in the person and the power of Jesus, can hardly imagine the death he endured. Now they feel not only the trauma of his death, but also the loss of his presence, friendship, and love.

The image in this upper room is very real and personal to these early disciples. It is also a universal image of humanity seeking the surety and stability of faith in times of crisis and uncertainty. A life that is not secure in faith does not know how to find the Lord for help. A person without faith does not have a foundation to stand on in uncertain times. Life without faith becomes a series of futile attempts to find meaning and security in times of anxious disorder.

These early disciples are going through the purifying fire of coming to a mature and living faith in the Lord Jesus risen from the dead. Jesus comes and stands among them, saying: "Peace be with you." It is a stunning moment. Unbelievable, astonishing, and joyful. They see Jesus in the flesh in his resurrected form. Everything is different. The moment is transforming. Fear and doubt have vanished, as joy rushes to the surface.

The anxious fear, trauma, and doubt are soon transformed into a blessed awakening and animation of a new way of life. Jesus is not present only to resolve the trauma of the Cross. He is present to initiate a new way of knowing and living in the action of Divine Mercy. The image of the Upper Room is not only for the first disciples, but for believers of every age. In the gospel of John, this is the moment of Pentecost.

Similar too his Baptism in the Jordan River, Jesus commissions and sends forth the Twelve, and every other disciple in the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Holy Spirit we are made a new creation. This is the action of our new creation mirroring God's action of breathing the breath of life into the nostrils of Adam and Eve making us spiritual beings. Freed from the old life of sin, through the dying and rising of Jesus, these disciples and believers of every generation are now a new creation in the power of the risen Lord.

Freed from fear and restored to hope, Jesus says to them: "Receive the Holy Spirit. The sins you forgive are forgiven; the sins you retain are retained." This is the action and the power of the Holy Spirit. The power of the Spirit is the power of the risen Lord who has defeated the separation caused by sin. Now forgiven, we are given the power and the commission to forgive others. This is the animation, motivation, and inspiration of our new life given in the risen Christ. Endowed and consecrated with the Spirit of Jesus, our call is to continue the work he had begun. Imagine how animated and motivated the first disciples must have been to realize not only that they have been forgiven, absolved, and completely accepted by Jesus, but also to have the inner identity and personal authority to forgive others.

The grace to forgive sin is the gift of love given in the Holy Spirit. Forgiving love is expressed and exercised as mercy. It does not happen on the surface. Forgiveness is hard and often costly. Negative emotions of loss and hurt are not easily resolved. Forgiveness is a decision deeper than the surface tensions of hurt feelings or emotions. The love through which mercy flows comes from the heart. The heart of the mature believer knows this because they have accepted and embraced the mercy of the risen Lord. Anyone who accepts this truth with confident hope in heaven will know that true forgiveness comes from that inner place where Jesus dwells in us.

Doubt and resistance will always be part of this story. It is the human way. Thomas needs proof. He wants to see and feel the wounds of Jesus before he will believe. Jesus welcomes, even insists that Thomas does a full inspection. "Put your finger here and see my hands, bring your hand and put it into my side." In that awkward moment Thomas surrenders doubt as he responds, "My Lord and my God." Resistance is a waste of time. Mercy is always present, always needed, and always readily given. Put aside fear and doubt for the risen One who is alive and well, present in you through the Holy Spirit. Peace be with you. In Christ, your sins are forgiven.

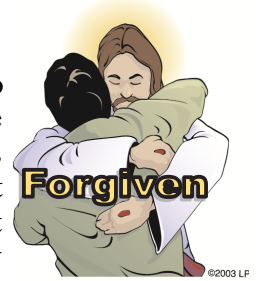

## 2<sup>ND</sup> SUNDAY OF EASTER

It's common for Catholics to hear the question, "Why do I have to go to a priest to have my sins forgiven?" I've never liked that question because not only is it clunky (confession is the ordinary way for the pardoning of serious sins, not lesser ones). But it misses the larger context: the wonderful origins of the sacrament itself. And this context is deeply Jewish.



Ancient Jews associated forgiveness of sins with priests offering sacrifices in the Jerusalem temple. It was a solemn, public, and tangible way to access God's mercy. So when the risen Jesus breathes on the Apostles and says, "**Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained**" (John 20:23), the upshot is remarkable: he is the new temple and his Apostles are the new priests. Jerusalem is no longer the place to find forgiveness from sin. Jesus' body, the Church, is.

So why should we go to the Sacrament of Confession? For the same reason ancient Jews went to the temple in Jerusalem: to experience the intimacy, joy, and life-giving power of God's eternal forgiveness.



## WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### SIN

**Question:** If Jesus destroyed sin, why are sins still with us?

**Answer:** We are the children of God, heirs of the Father's work, which is life. The struggle is between good and evil and the greatest weapon of evil is death. It is final — the end of hope and all possibility of change. Jesus must destroy death so that life, eternal life, might be possible. That is why Jesus dies: to take on sin's weapon and destroy it by his resurrection. It was not to satisfy God's sense of justice, but to meet sin on its own terms and defeat it.

Since we are heirs and coworkers with God, ours is the struggle with the remnants of evil, its last desperate attempt to overcome good. Like Jesus, we are about the Father's business in our daily life, carrying the message of salvation to everyone. We are strengthened in our struggle and come to realize the great gift of life with which we are graced. It is our hope that one day we will rejoice with the Father in a job well done! ©LPi

## DEVOTIONS, *EXPLAINED!* – CONNECT WITH TRADITION AND GROW YOUR FAITH

### Sprinkling Rite, *Explained*

The rite of sprinkling, also called the Asperges rite, describes the act of sprinkling the congregation with holy water, an action which recalls the new life we received in the waters of our baptism.

If this rite is performed during Mass, it takes the place of the penitential act.

The sprinkling rite usually takes place on Sundays during the Easter season but is permitted on any Sunday. When it is completed, the congregation sings the Gloria.

The name "asperges" comes from the first line of Psalm 51, a penitential psalm that begins with the words "Have mercy on me." In the Extraordinary Form of the Mass, the Asperges rite is done before each principal Mass, except on Palm Sunday.

The tool used by the priest to sprinkle the congregation is called the aspergillum, and the bucket containing the water is called the aspersorium. ©LPi

## GETTING TO KNOW OUR SAINTS

ST. ANSELM | APRIL 21  
C. 1033-1109

St. Anselm of Canterbury left his home in Italy to travel as a young man and ended up at the monastery in Bec, France, which was known for the teachings of its leader, Lanfranc. Anselm rose quickly to become abbot of the community and his writings are now compared in importance to those of St. Augustine.

In 1093 Anselm was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury by William II Rufus, the son and successor of William the Conqueror. However, at the time there was a controversy in Europe over whether kings or the pope had the power to invest bishops. Anselm, who believed only the pope should have the right to invest an ecclesiastical authority, spent much of his time as Archbishop exiled in Rome.

St. Anselm's teaching and works of theology are his most important contribution to the Catholic faith. He is considered of the fathers of scholastic theology and his chief achievement in philosophy was the ontological argument for the existence of God. His work *Cur Deus homo?* taught that atonement for sins could only be achieved through Christ. He was canonized in 1494 and named a Doctor of the Church in 1720.

I always believed I would have a renewed relationship with my sister when my father's death would come to pass. Two weeks after he passed, my sister suddenly died as well. There is no rewind of time. Yes, good stewards, today is the day!

My daughter recently asked me if it's okay to "wonder if all the Jesus stuff is true."

I wasn't surprised by her question. I've expected it, in fact. If you're raising a child to be a critical thinker, you don't want them to accept everything you tell them simply because it comes from your lips. I have promised my children that I will always give them the truth about God. But that's all I can do — give it to them. Whether or not they accept it, ultimately, is their own choice.

"I know it's true," she told me. "But sometimes it just all sounds so...unbelievable."

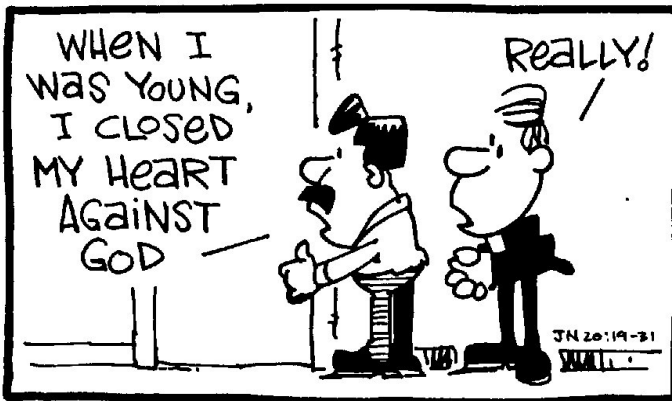
She's not wrong. It *does* sound unbelievable that an all-powerful God could create us for no reason other than sheer love, that He could be generous enough to give us free will to accept that love, that he could be merciful enough not to destroy us when we reject that love, and finally that he could be faithful enough in that love to become flesh and die in order to save us from the consequences of our own poor choices.

But lots of things are unbelievable. That doesn't mean they're not true.

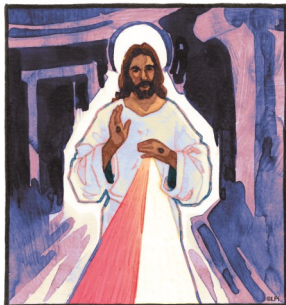
When Jesus says, "Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed," he isn't calling Thomas a fool for questioning something that sounds a little outrageous. He's just highlighting the fact that Thomas is afforded a luxury that none of the Christians born after him, my daughter included, will have: he gets to see proof with his own eyes.

I told my daughter it's fine to wonder — just don't wander. Take Thomas' example. Stay close to the people you trust. Return to the warmth of the upper room. Be willing to recognize Jesus when he's in front of you. Never be afraid to believe.
