### **From The Pastor**

You must know by now that if I had the choice, I would always prefer to speak of the gospel rather than money or administration. However, as a Pastor, I do not have the luxury of choice in this matter. You are quite aware the first Sunday of May is the beginning of the annual CSA appeal.

I am pleased to begin by thanking you for your generous response to last year's appeal as we sought to reach for an additional \$50,000. We did not make the \$50,000 but we did exceed our goal by almost forty thousand dollars. Congratulations! Thank you to all who helped to make this possible.

Our theme this year is "Do you love Me? Feed my Sheep." I am sure this reference relates to the opening homily of our new Archbishop, Edward Weisenburger. The work of the CSA is our commitment to serve the needs of the larger Church beyond our parish for the sake of the gospel to give hope to all believers.

Our goal this year is \$37,917. This is a decrease of more than two hundred dollars, indicating an overall decrease in offertory and supplemental income. Our primary need this year is greater support for our operating budget. Our physical plant, church, and grounds are in good shape. The only ongoing active expense is parking lot maintenance. This and other unforeseen physical needs can be paid from our savings account.

My request this year is to ask you to please repeat or increase the gift you made last year. If you have not been able to give in the past to this appeal or offer a weekly gift, anything you can do will be of value to support our daily operations. Like last year, our greatest loss of income is the decrease in the rent money received from the Charter School. This supplemental income is currently \$100,000 less than it was prior to the covid pandemic.

Please see my letter sent through the mail regarding this appeal. I will repeat the increase I offered in my CSA gift of last year. I ask for your generosity and prayer for the success of this important work. Questions may be addressed to the parish office. Thank you for your faithful consideration.

What happened to the old Peter lost in fear and occupied with his ego prior to the death of Jesus? After encountering the Risen Christ in the Upper Room, Peter and the other Apostles are transformed

in a way no one could ever imagine. After Jesus is arrested, Peter vehemently denied knowing him. Days later, fearful and locked behind closed doors, Peter encounters Jesus in an undeniable way that transformed his life. Empowered by the Holy Spirit, he now boldly gives witness to the same ones of whom they were so afraid.

The story comes full circle some days later at the seashore as the disciples are trying to catch fish. Notice how John, the gospel writer recreates the scene of the call of Peter. They are fishing all night and catch nothing as they see Jesus on the shore, not knowing it was he. Announcing they have caught nothing; Jesus directs another cast. They catch an abundance of fish whereupon they realize the man on the shore is Jesus.

Jesus uses the encounter to elicit the love and commitment of Peter after his denial. Consider the emotions and inner thoughts of Peter. 'Jesus, you know I love you and I know you love me. I know you understand and accept me because I feel and know your forgiveness. With your love and acceptance, I am learning to know and love myself because I have come to know and love you. I know I do not want to be without you. Where would I go? What more can I say? You confuse me, frustrate me, and challenge me, but I know I don't want to live without you. In the love you have given me, you know I will follow you.'

This is the transformation of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of Jesus. How is that felt and known in your faith, your relationship with Jesus? Think about who it is you love: Jesus, God, Savior? Then, not only who it is you love, but how you love Jesus/God. What motivates or inspires this love? What makes you come back to Jesus after a slip or fall, or a time of being away from the Lord? Like Peter, your words are likely to come hard. Does this give you pause?

This is when you remind yourself that you received the same Holy Spirit that Peter received. Your life and experience are different than Peter's. Your failures and successes are different, like your personality and life circumstance. Like Peter, the grace of the Spirit given to you is personal, specific, and uniquely made for you. As we approach the feast of Pentecost, spend some time how you would answer Jesus if he asked you, "Do you love Me?"





## 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Easter

I eat breakfast. If I don't have something substantial, I'm fading by midmorning. Breakfast is my key meal because it sets up my physical wellbeing for the rest of the day.

Spiritually speaking, we need sustenance to get us going. This is true for the Apostles in this Sunday's remarkable Gospel reading. The risen Jesus makes his third appearance to them in the early morning light and calls, **“Come, have breakfast” (John 21:12)**. The exhausted and cold fishermen sit, and he feeds them bread and fish as the dawn breaks. They are overwhelmed by his presence to the point of awestruck silence. As they eat, their bodies and their hearts come alive. Once refreshed by their morning meal, they will be ready to feed others — indeed, the whole world — with the love of the risen Jesus. But first, they need breakfast from him.

Do you realize how essential early morning prayer is? Jesus desires to refresh us every morning with his word of love, with his grace-filled presence. This week, hear Jesus calling to you: “Come, have breakfast!” Embrace some form of spiritual, meditative practice each morning for spiritual strength to get you going.

## The Witnesses of What Makes No Sense

It never fails to amuse me that the disciples in today's Gospel don't recognize Jesus until he asks them to do something that makes absolutely no logical sense.

He's just some random stranger on the shore — until he gives them an order that, in any other circumstances, would have them rolling their eyes into the backs of their head: *Drop the nets again. I know you haven't caught anything all night. I know you're tired. Just do it one more time. Trust me. Again.*

That's when they recognize him.

The disciples display such poor recognition of Jesus after the resurrection. I'm sure there's a good, theologically sound reason for it, one I am not smart enough to explain. Whatever that reason is, it's very clear that God was carefully orchestrating these moments of realization. He is trying to tell us something about how we recognize the risen Christ — the one who has conquered sin, the one whose love was stronger than death. The one who never made any sense, and never will, because his kingdom is not of this world, and to understand him — to recognize him — you have to detach from the priorities, the expectations, the limitations of this present world.

You have to be willing to do what makes no sense.

Love — again, even when it doesn't make sense. Forgive — again, even when it doesn't make sense. Believe — again, even when it doesn't make sense.

"We are the witnesses of these things," Peter tells the Sanhedrin (Acts 5:32). Peter, who was so full of joy when he recognized Jesus that he leapt into the sea, fully clothed, desperate to be near him.

It makes no sense, and that's okay. That's kind of our whole thing, as Christians. We are the witnesses of the things that make no sense.

## LIVING WITH PARKINSON'S

Parkinson's disease is a neurodegenerative disorder that affects dopamine producing neurons in the brain. Symptoms develop slowly over years and can be different from one person to another. The symptoms can range from changes in movement to cognitive impairments such as depression and anxiety. The cause is unknown but it is believed that it is related to a combination of genetic and environmental factors. There is no cure and treatment options vary from medications to lifestyle changes and surgery.

Father Domenico Vitulli described his life with Parkinson's. "Parkinson's has taken control of my body and mind. I want to stay still, but I must move; I want to walk, but I am forced to stop; I want to express a thought, but the words elude me. My mind grows sluggish, and I start to doze off, but giving in depresses me. My arm, shoulder, and leg ache at times; my thighs stiffen in the afternoon, and getting out of bed in the morning is laborious with stabbing back pain."

As a caregiver to your loved one's Parkinson's journey, the role of care partner is something you grow into. In the early stages you will build your knowledge base and provide support. This is a time to talk to your loved one about how to navigate this journey together. As the disease progresses you may see changes in how the person feels, thinks and reasons. They can become depressed, sad, or anxious. Look for support groups nearby for yourself and your loved one. Exercise for both of you is a form of medication that helps prevent a decline in your quality of life.

As Parkinson's symptoms advance your loved one will need more time to complete tasks. This is the time for you to become adaptable. Seek a referral for physical or occupational therapy and rearrange things so they are easier to reach, use electric toothbrushes and shavers. Anticipate changes in the ability to move, involuntary movements of face, arms, legs, or trunk. Let your care team know so medications can be adjusted.

In the advanced stage the person with Parkinson's is no longer independent. Try to stick to a daily routine. Try to make time with your loved one that is not focused on caregiving tasks. Schedule a time to rest. Thinking and memory changes could include forgetfulness, confusion, and compulsive behaviors. This can be frustrating and frightening but they need to be acknowledged. Try to use the same cues when providing care, Try using humor to diffuse a stressful situation. Avoid sarcastic remarks that can be misinterpreted.

## GETTING TO KNOW OUR SAINTS

**ST. ROSE VENERINI**  
**(1656-1728)**

**FEAST DAY - MAY 7**

The story of St. Rose of Venerini is one of having faith in God and his calling in your life. Born in Italy in 1656, she was the daughter of a doctor. Following the death of her fiancé, she entered a convent in the hopes of becoming a nun, but soon returned home to care for her mother after the death of her father. In an effort to keep up her spiritual side, St. Rose invited women of the neighborhood to recite the rosary in her home, and together they formed a sodality.

Unsure of where her life was headed, she sought the spiritual guidance of a Jesuit priest. After much contemplation, she admitted to feeling called to be a teacher in the world, rather than a nun in a convent. Eventually, she moved ahead and opened a free school for girls in 1685. Eventually, she was invited to oversee the training of teachers and the administration of schools in the Diocese of Montefiascone, which then led to being called upon to organize schools in many parts of Italy, including Rome.

St. Rose died in Rome in 1728 amid a number of miracles that many credit to her. The group of women she first prayed with in her home eventually became known as the Venerini Sisters, found in the United States and working among Italian immigrants. St. Rose was beatified in 1952 and canonized in 2006.

God calls us in every stage of life. This week is the feast of Louise de Marillac. As a young girl, she felt called to the religious life. However, she received advice to marry instead. Her husband died 12 years into their marriage. In the wake of her husband's death, she met St. Vincent de Paul. She was greatly inspired by his work with the poor, and he became her spiritual director. She began a training center out of her own home to train other young women to serve the poor and sick. This became the Sisters of Charity. The religious order began to grow, as slowly more sisters joined to work in hospitals and orphanages across France. The Sisters of Charity now serve worldwide. When your life takes an unexpected turn, consider where God might be calling you!

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### RESPONDING TO GOD

**Question:** I can't explain it. I feel a nudge from God to do something out of the ordinary. How do I respond?

**Answer:** You're in good company! Abraham was asked to leave all he knew and loved for a strange land, with only abstract divine assurance that such a sacrifice would be worth it. Plenty of prophets protested against God's call, whether it was claiming they were too young (Jeremiah) or running away entirely, only to end up in a whale's belly (Jonah). St. Joseph was asked to do something very strange. He was asked to believe — on the word of an angelic appearance in a dream — that his betrothed was pregnant not from another man, but by a miraculous intervention of God. Then he was called to marry her.

Author Flannery O'Connor once wrote, "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you odd." Sometimes God's invitation might seem strange or challenging. It might require sacrifices we never expected to make. Our life might look different than we had always imagined. But as we all know, life throws its own curveballs, regardless of whether or not we're listening for God's will. Better, one would think, to be open to the promptings of God and to follow along the strange trails that they lead. We have the assurance that, eventually, we will find green pastures. ©LPi

## DEVOTIONS, *EXPLAINED!* – CONNECT WITH TRADITION AND GROW YOUR FAITH

### HAIL Mary, *Explained*

The words of the Hail Mary — undoubtedly the most recognizable Catholic prayer after the Lord's Prayer — are deeply rooted in scripture. The opening lines of the prayer are taken from the words of the angel Gabriel at the Annunciation — "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee." This line is known as the Angelic Salutation. The following words — "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus" — echo the sentiments expressed by Elizabeth at the Visitation.

The Angelic Salutation is regarded as the earliest devotional prayer to Mary, since it forms the very first words spoken to her as the Mother of God, but Catholics did not begin to utilize the Hail Mary prayer in its current form until around the 11<sup>th</sup> century.

An in-depth explanation of each line of this prayer is provided in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2676-2677. ©LPi

**GIFTS IN DISGUISE**

Have you ever opened a gift and wondered what the giver was thinking?

I won’t call out any of my family or friends here, but suffice to say, I think we have all been the confused recipient of a sweater that wasn’t our size or a gift card to a store where we don’t shop. But we smiled all the same and said how much it meant to us, because we know that when it comes to gifts, it’s all about the gesture.

Suffering is a lot like that — the gift you never asked for, and don’t really want to receive. Sometimes we look at suffering and, like the apostles who see Jesus as a stranger on the shore, we don’t recognize it for what it can be. We don’t appreciate the catalyst suffering can be for change, for growth, for grace.

What was the gift that you received in disguise? Was it a relationship that confounded and frustrated you? Was it a job that tested your spirit? An obstacle that stopped you dead in your tracks? A rejection that threatened to break your spirit?

If I go back and look at the worst gifts I’ve ever gotten, chances are that I didn’t like them because I didn’t know what to do with them — they were more fitted for someone else’s interests, someone else’s life. It’s the same with suffering. We’re tempted to cast suffering aside when it comes our way because it doesn’t fit the person we are. Suffering is made to fit the person God knows we have the ability, with His grace, to become.

Hang onto that suffering. Unlike the misshapen sweater, it really will come in handy.


