From The Pastor

Love is the power that secures faith and inspires hope in good times. In times of uncertainty and fear, faith and hope can waver if the power and source of love is threatened. Love always holds an element of faith with proportionate hope. In the face of the Cross even Jesus knew the pains of uncertainty and resistance. In the power of the Father's love, Jesus persevered.

Different expressions of fear are found over three hundred times throughout the Bible. For instance, in today's gospel Jesus says to the disciples, "Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." The words are an expression of kindness knowing the fear and concern of the fearful disciples.

The setting is the Last Supper. The Apostles have not yet encountered the trauma of the Lord's death on the Cross, but they know something critical is on the horizon. In the mutual love shared between Jesus and his followers the fear of losing Jesus is thick with fear.

In today's reading, even before the Crucifixion, Jesus talks about his departure. Still unaware of the Cross, the disciples fear that Jesus will be leaving them. The death of Jesus will have its own trauma, but now in these words Jesus is referring to his Ascension after the Resurrection. Consider the fear and uncertainty of the disciples who think Jesus will be leaving them.

At this point in his human-divine journey, Jesus knows all that will take place in the will and intention of the Father's work of redemption. He is preparing the disciples for his departure which are never words loving friends want to hear. Separation from loved ones creates fear and uncertainty about the future. Quite aware, Jesus prepares these early believers for the coming of the Holy Spirit.

The conundrum of the Christian life is that the peace of Christ promised us by Jesus stands in close relationship with suffering. The peace of Christ is not the peace of the world. The peace of Christ is the promise and surety of the presence of God within the believer. The peace of Christ is Christ himself in the constancy of his presence in

each of us through the Holy Spirit. The disciples could not know this before the Holy Spirit had descended upon them. In the reception of the Holy Spirit their lives are transformed. No longer afraid, they are able to find courage and peace in the surety of the Lord's power in them through the faith and love they hold in his name.

This does not mean happily ever after. Human love and Christian love must persevere through the trials and sufferings of this life. Love is self-giving and self-giving is rarely a bed of roses. Yet, in the surety and commitment of the love modeled by Christ, we can persist through the fear, uncertainty, and sometimes critical irritations to be faithful to the love we profess. Isn't love purified and strengthened through times of crisis? Love in times of fear and uncertainty is the balm that calms the agitations that demand a quick fix. Suffering in love for the good of others is evidence of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus offers the commitment of the Father's love. In another verse, Jesus says, "the one who loves me will be loved by my Father. We will love him and make our dwelling in him." To have faith and love for Jesus unites the believer in the love of the Father and the Holy Spirit.

This is the peace Jesus gives. In two weeks, we will celebrate the Feast of Pentecost. Yes, love comes with suffering, but those who profess the love and Lordship of Jesus will be given the Holy Spirit. We become temples, a dwelling place of the Spirit who will animate and strengthen us in every trial as we seek to put into practice the way of Jesus.

This is not an if or a when. In Baptism, we are already temples of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit of God, the Spirit of Christ dwells in us. In times of fear, uncertainty, weariness, or doubt, we can turn inward and call forth the Spirit of God to strengthen us through every trial.

As recently read in [Jesus Calling](#), do not work for an easy, problem free life. It is not reality. In times of trial or distress, turn to the Lord with trust and anticipation seeking his guiding help. You are never alone. Jesus in the Spirit is always present. Stressful time? Intentionally give praise to God.

Jonathan Haidt’s 2024 book entitled “The Anxious

Generation” argues that today’s kids are marked by significant increases in anxiety, as the title suggests. Smartphones, social media, economic uncertainty, the chaos of a global pandemic, fear regarding climate change, and the so-called “meaning crisis” all contribute to strikingly high levels of anxiety in young people today. I’m a bit older than this generation, but I feel it, too. The world can be too much to handle.

The Gospel this week offers a stunning solution for troubled souls. To his overwhelmed and anxious disciples, the risen Jesus says, “**Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you**” (John 14:27). His peace is that of the one who was overwhelmed on the cross and then conquered death by the power of his divinity, his bond of love with the Father. He offers us this unshakeable peace.

Of course, mental illness does not magically disappear because of the risen Jesus. But he does walk with us and offer us his peace in the midst of our suffering. The peace the world gives is not like his because it is weak, uncertain, and self-generated. Jesus’ peace is strong, sure, and given as a gift from God. He gives it to us amid our anxiety. Will you receive it as a gift? I hope so. He wants to fill the hearts of this generation with his peace.

“7. In addition to finding hope in God’s grace, we are also called to discover hope in the *signs of the times* that the Lord gives us. As the Second Vatican Council observed: “In every age, the

Church has the responsibility of reading the signs of the times and interpreting them in the light of the Gospel. In this way, in language adapted to every generation, she can respond to people’s persistent questions about the meaning of this present life and of the life to come, and how one is related to the other”. [4] We need to recognize the immense goodness present in our world, lest we be tempted to think ourselves overwhelmed by evil and violence. The signs of the times, which include the yearning of human hearts in need of God’s saving presence, ought to become signs of hope.

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?
CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED**

SUNDAY MASS

Question: Why do Catholics need to go to Mass every Sunday?

Answer: The heart of the Church’s instruction that we are to attend Mass on Sundays goes back to the Third Commandment: “Take care to keep holy the sabbath day as the LORD, your God, has commanded you” (Deuteronomy 5:12). Although the Jewish People celebrate the Sabbath on Saturday, the first generations of Christians began to observe the sabbath on Sunday, recognizing how important it is for Christians to celebrate the day that Jesus rose from the dead. As the United States Catholic Catechism for Adults observes, “Sunday extends the celebration of Easter throughout the year ... It makes present the new creation brought about by Christ” (364).

The focus of our Sunday should be the celebration of the Eucharist in the Mass. This is our time to be formed by God’s Word and nourished at the table of the Lord, becoming prepared to live out and share our faith in the week that follows. In his encyclical, *Dies Domini*, Pope Saint John Paul II reminded us that Christians “cannot live their faith or share fully in the life of the Christian community unless they take part regularly in the Sunday Eucharistic assembly” (no. 81). This is why the Church teaches us that Sunday Mass is a non-negotiable part of being a Christian (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2192).

Beyond being a time of worship, we should also remember that Sunday is intended to be a day of rest, when we make time for recreation, for sharing meals, and enjoying the company of friends and family. Sunday is given to us as a day to take stock of and enjoy the blessings that God has given us (see *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, no. 2187). Pope Francis reminds us, “The day of rest, centered on the Eucharist, sheds its light on the whole week, and motivates us to greater concern for nature and the poor” (*Laudato Si'*, no. 237). ©LPi

PRAYER AFTER MEALS, Explained

Just as praying before a meal, praying after a meal is meant to inspire in Christians an attitude of thanksgiving and an acknowledgment of our dependence on God.

Though it is a less common practice in the modern world, early Church fathers like Tertullian and St. Jerome extolled the importance of praying after a meal, and the Christian poet Prudentius composed hymns for before and after meals (“ante cibum” and “post cibum”).

There are no “official” prayers for after a meal, but the most common one said by Catholics is this: “We give thee thanks, almighty God, for all your benefits, who lives and reigns forever and ever. And may the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God rest in peace.” It is a benediction which recalls our perpetual fellowship with the entire Body of Christ, including those who have passed from this life. ©LPi


**ST. MARY ANN OF JESUS OF PAREDES
1618-1645
MAY 26**

Though she lived a short life compared to others, St. Mary Ann of Jesus of Parades had a huge impact on those she served in the name of God.

The youngest of eight children, she was born in Ecuador, which at the time was under Spanish control. After joining the Secular Franciscans, St. Mary Ann of Jesus of Paredes led a life of prayer and penance at home, leaving her parents' home only to attend Mass and perform works of charity whenever she was needed.

During her life, St. Mary Ann of Jesus of Paredes established a clinic and school for Africans and indigenous Americans. When a plague broke out, she stayed to nurse the sick, but unfortunately died shortly after. She was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

MY PEACE I GIVE TO YOU

When John has a vision of heavenly Jerusalem, he sees walls. “A massive, high wall,” to be more precise. In the modern lexicon, walls have a negative connotation; we use them as metaphors for all that is exclusionary and rigid. But throughout much of history, walls have meant something very different. In the ancient world, walls meant safety.

Walls meant peace.

“My peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you,” Jesus tells his disciples in today’s Gospel. “Not as the world gives do I give it to you.”

So what’s the difference between the peace we know in the world, and the peace we know in Christ?

Well, I would argue that the difference is that the peace we know in Christ *exists*. We know no real peace in this world. Sometimes, we witness a sort of mirage of peace — something *like* it, but just a little off, and always on the horizon, never within reach.

Peace, to me, means rest. It means quiet. It means the absence of confrontation, of conflict, of anxiety. But I can’t actually experience any of that in this life, not in a substantial way. I can rest — but I never really feel rested. I can retreat to a room by myself to have silence, but someone always knocks on the door, and even if they don’t, my thoughts get pretty loud.

And boy oh boy, are those thoughts full of confrontation. Full of anxiety, full of conflict. Wherever I go to find peace, the world finds *me* and banishes it.

I think of the walls of heavenly Jerusalem, so high and so sturdy, guarded so scrupulously by God’s strongest angels. These walls are not barriers. They are shields. They are arms, encircling us, gathering us in.

In Christ alone can we find peace in this world.


