From The Pastor

It impresses me that Advent is often presented and received as a gentle season of attentive, if not sentimental, preparation for Christmas. Advent does not seem to carry the weight and impact of the hard punching weeks of Lent in preparation for the Passion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus. I am not sure this is the right tone for Advent. We can all recall when Advent was a kind of mini-Lent that had a penitential tone of readiness and preparation.

Consider more closely the reality of what we are asked to prepare ourselves for. In truth, the season could not be more radical. After generations of ardent longing through many forms of suffering, oppression, human infidelity and idolatry, God breaks into the world through the womb of the Virgin Mary to bring forth the Incarnate Son. There is nothing more radical that has ever happened or will ever happen in the created world.

Advent is time centered. So radical is the coming of God into our world that it gains its own title: 'In the fullness of time,' God in Christ, born of the Virgin, given the name "Jesus" is, in himself the fullness of time. All time, before and after the inbreaking of God in our world, is now measured through the person of Jesus as the Christ and Redeemer.

Advent is celebrated by the Universal Church as the corporate Body of Christ. By necessity, the feast demands the attention and commitment of each of us personally. Yes, God came to all of us and to the fullness of creation, but we cannot think that widely. To do so makes the reality too abstract. We must make the reality of 'God with us' immediate and in the context of our lives, both in the rhythms of our personal life situation as well as in the situation of the Church and world that surrounds us.

Advent is a liminal time. It is a time that leaves us in the in-between what was, against what is coming. This is a holy, yet unsettled place to find ourselves. Change is naturally upsetting to human beings, especially unexpected change leading to an unknown future. This is where we find ourselves in the restructuring of the Archdiocese. As a matter of course, I will do the best I can to keep you informed as the process moves along. I can tell you there will not be week-to-week updates. The overall process is formatted in three phases with intentional work accomplished in each phase. In time, after the first of the year I think, there will be a series of listening sessions when parishioners will have the opportunity

to voice their concerns and advocate for their parish. These listening sessions will be in the second phase of the process. The third phase will be in the Spring of 2026 with further discernment and final plan proposals. The process is scheduled for completion and implementation by July 1st of 2027. When I know more specific details, I am committed to keeping you informed.

I am pleased and grateful to the eight people in our parish who have generously agreed to be key parish leaders (KPL) in this process. Their time commitment will include training to be listeners and table facilitators as we move through this process. I will introduce them at Mass and will have their names in the bulletin. They know what I know, which at this point is not much. They will do the best they can to answer your questions and relay information. Please be kind, patient, and courteous to these generous parishioners.

Most importantly, please use the season of Advent to secure yourself in the faith we so dearly profess. Please consider these reflection questions to center yourself in Christ in a way that will lead you to a deeper awareness of His presence in you.

Advent means 'coming' or 'an anticipated coming.' What is pregnant or coming to birth in you as a person of faith through the rhythms of your life? What are you longing for, most deeply desiring that you know is in you, but you do not know how it will come forth? Our ancestors, both near and far, felt this way. They longed for something (a Messiah/Savior), but they did not know how, who, or when. That is the nature and the birthing of the Advent season. God is doing something in you. What could it be? God is doing something in the Church and in the world. What will it be and what role, position, or place will God ask you to play? Consider Mary at the time of the Annunciation. She knew very little, except the mystery that stirred in her heart which she allowed to change and transform her life into becoming the Mother of our Savior.

Times change and we must change with them. Change is mostly unwanted, and not easy, but essential to the rhythms of God's plan for our salvation into the light of heavenly glory. Buckle up, it is a brave and radical season, and you are an important part of it.



Have No Fear

“So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come.”

This week we hear that ominous Gospel passage where Jesus tells us about people being taken from where they are and what they are doing when they least expect it, while others remain. This has been distorted by some for support into a spectacular idea of rapture, leading to many books and movies. A profitable genre has been created that sometimes preys on people’s fears.

But in following Jesus Christ, there is no fear. What we are called to do is live each day as it were our last. Be mindful of all the opportunities around you to share love and the gifts God has given you. We will all be held accountable in the end, but it is not what we have done that will save us. Our salvation lies in the grace freely given to us by Jesus. When we choose to receive that gift and intentionally follow him, we are led to giving over our entire being totally to him.

This Advent, let’s not allow ourselves to be caught up in all the craziness of the season, but instead give ourselves over to God to use for his glory. The Incarnation born in a manger is calling you. Have no fear! ©LPi

WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

STRIKE OUR CHEST: PENITENTIAL ACT

Question: When we say the Penitential Act at Mass, why do we strike our chest three times?

Answer: Our rituals and liturgical celebrations are filled with a variety of symbols, some of which also relate to our gestures and physical postures (e.g. kneeling, sitting, processing, making the Sign of the Cross). The custom of striking our breast three times during the “I Confess” of the Penitential Act of the Mass is one of those gestures that is loaded with symbolism.

The tradition of Christian’s striking the breast (above the heart) is rooted in the image of Sacred Scripture, especially texts like Psalm 51 which speak of a “humbled contrite heart” or how God heals broken hearts, binding up our wounds (see Psalm 147:3). Early Christian writers like Saint Augustine of Hippo and Saint Jerome also refer to this custom in their writings.

Ultimately, this practice is an expression of our sorrow for those times when we have been guilty of faults and a sign that we are willing to take responsibility for our sins and failings. That we all perform this gesture together is also an act of solidarity, recognizing that none of us, regardless of where we are on our journey of faith, is without fault and the need for grace and forgiveness. ©LPi

ST. ANDREW CHRISTMAS NOVENA, *Explained!*

The St. Andrew Christmas novena is a prayer said from November 30, the Feast of St. Andrew, through Christmas Eve. Traditionally, it is recited 15 times each day.

The Gospel of John tells us that St. Andrew was a disciple of John the Baptist who heard John call Jesus “the Lamb of God.” Andrew followed Jesus, curious about him, and realized that he was the Messiah, so he quickly found his brother, Peter, and the two became the first disciples.

In praying this novena, Christians follow the example of Andrew’s prescient faithfulness throughout the season of Advent. ©LPi

How to Pray the St. Andrew 25 Day Christmas Novena

Beginning November 30 and concluding December 24, the following novena prayer is prayed 15 times throughout the day.

Begin with the Sign of the Cross
Pray the St. Andrew Novena Prayer →
Name the intention - share your thoughts with God
End with Sign of the Cross.

DEVOTIONS, *EXPLAINED!* – CONNECT WITH TRADITION AND GROW YOUR FAITH

ST. NICHOLAS, *Explained!*

St. Nicholas was a fourth-century Christian bishop who lived in modern-day Turkey. There is minimal historical scholarship dating to the period of his life, but stories and traditions that developed after his death emphasize his profound spirit of generosity, especially towards the poor.

One particularly famous oral tradition tells that St. Nicholas saves three young women from a life of destitution and ruin by secretly giving them a dowry so they could marry. His popularity increased in the centuries following his death, and by the medieval period he was a beloved model of Christian charity invoked in a particular way during the seasons of Advent and Christmas.

On his feast day, Dec. 6, children often wake up to find small gifts or treats in their shoes or Christmas stockings, a tradition which has variations across different ethnic groups. In the United States, St. Nicholas gift-giving practices are especially popular in places where large numbers of German and Dutch immigrants settled. ©LPi

Watershed Moments

In every life there are watershed moments.

I think of our time on this earth as resembling, in the beginning, a fine, firm sheet of metal, suspended with perfect balance in time and space. If a drop of water falls upon the sheet, it remains precisely where it lands.

But life goes on. We see things, we feel things, and in the seeing and the feeling, the flat, smooth metal sheet is nicked. The impacts created by those experiences are like BB pellets riddling armor; before long, the surface is pockmarked. A falling drop of water will drain or pool either in one way or the other, its action determined by the closest indentation.

A watershed has been created, a summit or valley that disrupts the smooth flatness of life.

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks about the end of the world. I'm no Biblical scholar, but I suspect the topic at hand is the Apocalypse (capital A). The big one. The explosion that upends the sheet itself and sends every drop of water crashing down. But I think, in a smaller way, it's also about all the indentations on the plane: those little apocalypses (lowercase a), the things that felt like the end of the world (or the beginning of a new one).

The loss of a job. The breakup of a relationship. The suffering of a loved one.

Of course the world is ending. It has been ending forever. And the Son of Man is coming — but don't forget, he was already here, too. And his Spirit, even now, is renewing the face of the earth.

"But how?" we ask. "And when? And where?"

Without the chinks in the armor — without the watershed moments — there is tremendous smoothness, certainly. But there is also no movement.

So look to the watershed moments, these little (and big) apocalypses. In these moments that change us, for better or worse, God is there, working, waiting. ©LPI


