JANUARY 11, 2026 † BAPTISM OF THE LORD

From the Pastor

The Baptism of Jesus marked the closure of one frame of his life that led into a new beginning of public ministry. One expression of the Lord's baptism in the Jordan River by John is his desire to be one with the people. Jesus knew and felt the pain of the people in the heaviness of their lives and the weight and discouragement of their sin. Jesus identifies with their sin and wants to free them, all humanity, from sin that diminishes the life and Spirit of God in us. Jesus identified with John's baptism of repentance, not because He needed to repent, but because He would become the agent of our forgiveness that would lead us to a freedom of heart in true conversion. Jesus is saying yes to our human condition in a way that puts him in the position to accept our sinful nature as his own. In the fulfillment of his mission, Jesus accepts the reality of the Cross that bears the fruit of our redemption. For our redemption to be effective, Jesus must take all sin into his human nature so that through his divine nature his dying and rising on the Cross would consume evil, sin, and death. 'For our sake he who did not know sin became sin that we might become the righteousness of God in him. 2Cor. 5:21.

Jesus accepted John's baptism as an example for our sake that immediately leads to his Baptism in the Holy Spirit. The baptism of repentance is for the sake of conversion preparing the human heart for the greater Baptism in the Spirit that leads us to new life in God through Christ. The two baptisms are of different origins. John's baptism was of human origin. Baptism in the Spirit is of Divine origin.

Jesus accepts both for our sake and on our behalf. Coming out of the waters of repentance, Jesus experiences the Holy Spirit seen in the image of a dove. As one in union with the Holy Trinity, Jesus hears the voice of the Father saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." More than a baptism of repentance, Jesus is now confirmed in the affirmation of the Father's love. This Baptism also has two faces. The experience was deeply personal for Jesus in the call of his human nature to fulfill the role of his divine nature. Secondly, with intentional purpose, the Baptism of Jesus is our Baptism into the life of God: as for Jesus so for us. The humanity of Jesus includes all humanity for all things were created in him, for him, and through him. All the Father bestows on Jesus is also bestowed on us. The belovedness of the Father is intended for and bestowed on all humanity.

Consider, what did the Baptism of Jesus mean to

him? How did the power of this divine grace impact Jesus? Beyond the swelling of his heart in hearing the words of his Father's love for him, Jesus is confirmed in his Divine identity as the Son of God. This must have been deeply moving for Jesus. In his human emotions, Jesus is feeling the deep unconditional love of his Father. This is the love that unites the will of the Father and the Son. Each wants what the other wants, reconciliation for the sake of unity with humanity and all creation. In this essential identity as the beloved Son, Jesus is moved into the next step of his life in public ministry. Ultimately, this ministry will lead to the Cross. The scene concludes with Jesus being led by the Spirit into the desert to ponder the mystery and the grace of all that lies before him.

It begs the question, what does your Baptism mean to you? This is not a question that is often pondered or thought about, yet it is the foundation and identity of our lives in Christ. For myself, I relate to and identify with all that is said above. I was baptized into a generational Catholic family six days after I was born. Raised in a strong Catholic identity with numerous religious in the family, I quickly realized I was baptized into the larger family of the Church. God, Christ, and Church became a primary identity of my life. This does not mean to imply that I was a holy Joe of virtue. Most of you can identify with this snapshot of a 1950's Catholic family.

Soon enough, as I matured through various stages of faith, I chose to embrace what I had learned. It became a part of me in a deep way. As the years went by, I learned of the Holy Spirit and the call of a vocation. With much fear and trepidation, I entered the seminary at the age of 27 and began a journey toward ordination and priesthood. Early enough, I realized my sinful human nature which led me to embrace the gift of Jesus, the Cross, and the fruit of redemption more fully. I can see, feel, and deeply relate to the grace of my Baptism. I feel at home in Christ and deeply blest in the vocation to which I was called. I do not think of my Baptism in any regular way, but I am aware of feeling and knowing its grace, call, and action in my life.

What about you? What does your Baptism mean to you? How do you feel its grace in your identity, vocation, or state in life? Consider this freely without measure or judgment. Whatever you discover, you are a holy and beloved one of God.



THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Apple ran a commercial not long ago called “Behind the Mac – Greatness.” It shows artists and creators, such as Kendrick Lamar, Billie Eilish, and Lady Gaga, working behind their MacBooks. The narration says, “There’s a certain kind of person who doesn’t wait for greatness. They make it.” It’s a compelling message. There’s beauty in using our gifts with passion and purpose. But there lies a hidden weight in that idea: If you are what you make, what happens when you can’t anymore? When the project fails, the passion fades, or the spotlight moves on, where is greatness then?


Today’s Gospel offers a differing vision of greatness. Jesus steps into the Jordan River. He hasn’t preached, healed, or performed a single miracle. Then the heavens open, and the Father speaks: **“You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased.”** It’s not a reward for success. It’s not earned. Before he does anything “great,” Jesus receives the greatness of his identity from the Father.

And so do you. At your baptism, God said the same thing over you: “You are my beloved.” That is your true identity, not constructed or earned but received. When we see ourselves and others this way, everything changes for the better. We discover a greatness that can never be taken away.

This week, reflect on your baptism: look up the date, thank God for it, pray for those baptized with you, or visit the church where it happened. Let your identity be rooted there.





Staying Active as You Age

The National Institute of Health reports that physical activity is important at any age in life. Staying active lets you enjoy favorite activities, connect with friends and family, maintain a healthy weight, and boost fitness. Other benefits include improving functional ability preventing falls, prevention of chronic health problems, and supporting mental and emotional health.

There are three types of physical activity. Research indicates that it is important to incorporate all three types of exercise: aerobic activity, muscle-strengthening exercises, and balance training. There are some activities, like yoga, dancing, water exercise, that incorporate all of these.

Safety tips for exercise: listen to your body, do light activity to warm up, drink water, be aware of your surroundings, use safety equipment if required for your activity, move slowly to prevent falling, wear comfortable clothing and stable footwear. As always if you are unsure about doing a particular activity, seek guidance from your healthcare provider.

Exercise can develop your intention connecting your spiritual journey with your physical journey. For example, exercise in nature, yoga, mindful walking, Tai Chi, and dancing. You can express emotions, feel joyful, and connect to your inner self.

Overall, physical activity improves our independence and independent living. All will be well in mind, body, and spirit.

TEMPTATION

Question: At times, temptation seems so powerful that it is almost impossible to resist. How can I be stronger in my resolve to avoid sin and temptation?

Answer: The saints have written that every human person desires the good. In a sense, we don't desire sin itself. Temptation is powerful because there is at least some bit of good in it. Even in the blackest of sin, there is something good that becomes twisted. We can look for good in sin when we feel it is lacking in our own life. When we lack true relational intimacy, it can be easy to turn to lust. When we lack confidence in God in our own lives, it can be easy to judge others or to grasp for control over situations. When we lack peace in the present moment, it can be easy to compete with others or to treat others poorly in our quest for success.

Overcoming temptation isn't just about repressing our sinful desires. If that's all we do, they'll just burst out someplace else! If there is a recurring temptation in your life, prayerfully consider *why* this is so appealing to you. Submit this to God and bring it to a wise person. And in the meantime, continue to resist temptation to sin. If we fail to choose God in small choices, we're several steps down the road towards failing in larger ones. Pray for the grace to persevere!

Joy, Explained!


Though it is often used as a synonym for happiness, joy has far more to do with the choices we make than the emotions we feel.

Joy is the experience of achieving what we most desire — and what we most desire is love. The virtue of joy, therefore, is a fruit of the virtue of love, or charity (CCC 1829).

When Jesus Wades In

Usually, when God comes to us, we aren't ready.

We think we are. Like John the Baptist, we stand in our waters of baptism, certain of our mission. We know how it's going to go. We know what's going to be asked of us. We're sure of it.

Christ wades into the waters. And he screws up all our plans.

To be clear, I don't think John the Baptist lacks faith when he balks at the idea of baptizing Jesus. I think it is, in fact, a testament to his humility. But whatever motivated John's actions, he is — if even for a brief moment — hesitating to do the will of God. Just a few chapters after this in the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus will acknowledge that John is the greatest person "born of women" — with the caveat that even he is not perfect enough for the Kingdom of Heaven.

Not yet.

Jesus didn't give John an explanation as the two stood in the River Jordan. He merely said, "Allow it for now." John could have resisted further, demanding to understand why. He could have grown suspicious at the simplicity of Jesus' answer, at the strangeness of this request. He could have clung desperately to his version of How Things Are Supposed To Be, and in doing so, fostered doubt in his heart. He could have even stormed off, confused and angry.

He did none of these things, because John is, as Jesus says, the greatest born of women.

When the Holy Spirit descends and the voice of God declares, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased," he is referring, of course, to Jesus. But I think He would say the same of John the Baptist — and of all those who welcome Jesus into the waters, ready to do as he bids.

Lessons from Baptizing a Frog

I used to lead an RCIA session on baptism, where I would bring in my Kermit the Frog toy from when I was a child and pretend to baptize it. It was a session I especially made sure I led when we had children preparing for Easter sacraments. You would think Kermit would have become super holy having been baptized so many times, year after year. But, if he had been real, he would not have been any holier due to multiple baptisms than he was after the first baptism. He couldn't be re-baptized. (Not to mention, of course, he is a FROG.)

When Jesus came to John for baptism, he transformed the baptism of repentance that John was practicing into a baptism of redemption. And although we are called to repentance over and over in our life, redemption comes to us only once. We cannot get baptized again in the Jordan or Sea of Galilee because of romantic notions, or come into the Catholic Church by a second baptism so we can start all over. Our baptism, whether we can remember it or not, is a one-time deal. But it is the real deal. Whether you feel it or not, you are sealed for Christ, and the stain of original sin has been washed away.

Too many of us take that moment for granted. Yes, you may have been baptized as an infant. But much time has passed since then, and you can work to understand the impact that it had on your life. We sometimes look for a good time to begin living a stewardship way of life. However, that time already passed, and God has been waiting. We are called to reflect on our baptism and respond to the call it has placed on our lives. We can respond and be disciples, or we can be like Kermit the Frog, always searching for a new start that never comes.


