### **From The Pastor**

There is more than what meets the eye in the Ascension of Jesus. More than simply ascending into heaven after the Resurrection, the feast of the Ascension signals an essential movement in the work of our redemption. As a Solemnity, the Ascension rises to the highest level of a feast day. Why? That Jesus ascends to heaven in glory after his Resurrection is obvious. What is less clear and not often understood is that the ascension of Jesus is also the ascension and exaltation of all humanity.

The Church expresses the Paschal Mystery in three movements of Divine action. It begins with the work of creation as God creates out of love for the sake of love and the ultimate union of all that is created. The second movement of God's action is the work of redemption. The work of redemption was always present with God as the Word to be made flesh. Our redemption actively begins with the Annunciation of the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary. With Mary's yes to the invitation of the angel, the infant Jesus is conceived in her womb. "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." Jesus matures into the adult Christ surrendering himself to the Cross to defeat the lie of evil, the disorder of sin, and the sadness of death.

This is the Paschal Mystery: through death to new life. Jesus, the Divine Son freely chose to give his life for the sake of our redemption. The Incarnation expresses two movements. God in Christ, descends from the heavens through the power of the Holy Spirit to assume human flesh. Christ closes the gap between heaven and earth accepting our human condition in all things but sin, to reconcile us to the Father bringing unity to all humanity and creation.

The feast of the Ascension completes the second movement of God's action of creation – redemption. As expressed in the second reading today, Jesus ascends in exalted glory to the Father in heaven. The Christ, now risen from the dead, is received into glory by the Father. Having accepted our humanity and physicality, as Jesus ascends to heaven in his glorified human-divine nature, we ascend with him. Thus, his ascension becomes our own. The humanity of Jesus accepts and contains all humanity redeemed and justified through his dying and rising.

The Ascension completes the physical work-action of the Incarnation. The completed work of the Son initiates the third movement of God's work of creation-redemption-fulfillment. The third movement is the sending of the Holy Spirit. Christ is now present in all creation through the work-action of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit is given to all believers through the waters of Baptism to empower us to put into action in our lives the love Jesus modeled in his life.

Christ lives on in us and is made present in the world through the Holy Spirit. This is made clear in today's gospel as Jesus gives the disciples and all believers the great commission: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." This is the mission of all believers who seek the Divine way.

We are already in Christ. Through his blood we have been redeemed. In him and through him our place in heaven has been prepared. The invitation of our faith is to know Jesus in himself. To know Jesus as the Divine One, we ponder the life he lived as shared with us through the gospels. Further, through the grace and identity given us in Baptism, we are to know, accept, and love ourselves as the beloved of God in whom Christ dwells. This sounds like an impossible task which is precisely why we need and have been given the Holy Spirit. We cannot do it on our own, but if we accept, allow, and pay attention to the Holy Spirit, God will show the way. On a conscious or unconscious level, we are all seeking and longing for God. Why? Because God is always seeking and longing for us. This is what love does. The lover always seeks and longs for the beloved.

The Ascension is more than a nice way to get Jesus back to heaven after the Resurrection. It serves as an essential movement of our redemption that inspires our hope, promises us a share in God's glory, and empowers us with the Holy Spirit to know and follow the way.

For all the weakness, frustration, and inevitable failures of our human nature, Christ the Incarnate One has set us free. Feel the joy. Accept the Holy Spirit. Live a life of peace, doing what you can to put more love into the world. We are on our way to heaven.

## ASCENSION OF OUR LORD

I recently read a book called "The Defining Decade" by psychologist Dr. Meg Jay. She convincingly argues that a person's 20s are the most impactful decade of one's life. For example, a twenty-something who waits until she has absolute clarity before making commitments typically drifts and regrets it later. But those who dive into something meaningful — even with doubts and questions — tend to grow and find joy and better outcomes in life. In other words, it takes courage, not perfect certainty, to move forward.

As we celebrate the Ascension of the Lord, that insight comes alive in a new way. Matthew tells us: "When they saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted." (Matthew 28:17) Even standing before the risen Christ, the disciples were a mixture of adoration and hesitation. It is as though they were in their spiritual 20s...unsure, doubting, but nonetheless called to act in worship and mission.

Here is the key: Jesus does not tell them to wait until they are sure of things. He sends them anyway: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28:19) The mission of the Church begins not with perfect certainty but with imperfect disciples who wonder and worship. Then they get going.

That is us, too. We may feel unsure of ourselves, perhaps full of hesitation about following Christ more fully. But now is not the time to wait for perfect clarity. Now is the time to worship and to go, trusting that he is with us always, even to the end of the age.

**Question:** Paul offers a prayer of petition for believers to receive a Spirit of wisdom, revelation, and enlightenment. What might you petition from the Lord this week?

**Gospel:** Mt 28:16-20

**Question:** One of the final messages the resurrected Jesus tells his disciples is that “all power in heaven and on earth has been given to me.” Where do you see Jesus’ power at work on earth today?

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## VIRTUES, EXPLAINED! CONNECT WITH TRADITION AND GROW YOUR FAITH

### LOYALTY, EXPLAINED!

Pope Paul VI, in *Ecclesia Suam*, considered “loyalty, perseverance and self-sacrifice” to be the distinguishing marks of a Christian in a modern world that increasingly embraces relativism.

“The follower of Christ is not pliant and cowardly, but loyal and strong,” he wrote.

The virtue of loyalty is closely linked to the virtue of obedience, wherein we freely submit ourselves to rightful authority. As Catholics, we are called to be loyal to our bishops, to Scripture and Tradition, to the teaching authority of the Church (the Magisterium), and to the Christian way of life.

Loyalty is distinct from admiration for a person or institution, and even from respect. Admiration and respect can be rightfully earned and rightfully lost. Virtuous loyalty does not swerve from its object, and it flows forth from the one who gives it.

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## WHY DO WE DO THAT? CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

### ASCENSION OF THE LORD

**Question:** Couldn’t Jesus have done more good if he stayed on earth, rather than ascended into heaven?

**Answer:** This is an interesting question! During his earthly life, Jesus gave sight to the blind, healed paralytics, drove out demons, and fed thousands with only a few loaves of bread. Imagine what he could have done if he’d never ascended into heaven! Imagine what our world could be! It’s an interesting thought to consider, especially as the world faces challenges that only seem to deepen and expand. Yet at the Last Supper, Jesus says, “It is better for you if I go.” Why? His response must have seemed strange to the Apostles at the time. In his place, Jesus says, he will send the Paraclete, the Comforter, the Advocate. He promises to send the Holy Spirit.

Jesus’ departure allows the Apostles to become the leaders he has formed them to be. Jesus is no longer situated in only one geographical location, and his Church will never be a political kingdom. Soon after the Ascension, we celebrate Pentecost — the descent of the Holy Spirit and the radical empowerment of the followers of Jesus. We share in that empowerment and in that mission. Jesus is present in the sacraments, and he is present in us. Through our faith, hope, and love, we are called to be the good he does here on earth!

## He Will Return

I travel a good bit, which means I am away from my wife and children for decent periods of time. Then when I return, we become one again, and we are about the Lord's work together.

The Lord ascended into heaven, but we are not to sit by quietly awaiting his return. Much needs to be done. He has entrusted much to us, expecting us to be good stewards. If you think that you have all the time in the world to complete the tasks at hand, think again. His return will be when we least expect it. One of the fun things toddlers and very young children do is try to convince you that they aren't lying — you're just misunderstanding reality.

"I am NOT hitting you," they'll insist as they pummel your leg with their little fists, staring you down with the crazy-eyed glare of a person who really believes they can make something true if they say it loud enough.

It reminds me a little of Jesus, to be honest. "I am with you always!" he assures us...as he's literally leaving.

We know that Jesus is not a crazy-eyed toddler. He's telling the truth. So what in the world does he mean?

"I am with you." We say this to one another when we want them to know they have our support, often in a battle they must fight alone.

"I am with you." My mother-in-law said this to me over FaceTime during the pandemic shutdown as I was mourning a miscarriage. We were dozens of miles apart and quarantined.

"I am with you." I say this to my children when they are upset, frightened, melting down, sick — when they are caught in the throes of a bad experience I cannot personally climb into and stop.

I am with you. None of these promises are false. None of them are lies.

And neither, really, is the toddler lying. She's simply experiencing reality as a person who can't differentiate feelings from actions, will from choice. "I'm not hitting you!" she cries, when what she means to say is: "This anger is stronger than I am."

How many times have I pounded my own fists, crying, "I have faith!" when what I mean to say is, "My faith is failing. Where are you?"

I am with you.

This is the answer that always comes. The answer that will always come. Reality is like that. It exists, unchanging, whether we believe it or not.

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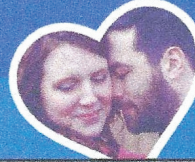
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
